Republican Primaries and Convention.

A delegate convention of republicans will be held in Rockwood hall, Saturday evening, March 30, 1889, at 8 o'clock for the purpose of nominating two members of the school board and other business that may come before the convention. An Ordinance

Levying a special tax and assessment on all lots within paying district No. 1 in the city of Platts mouth, to cover the cost of paving and curbing Main street between the east side of 24th street and west side of 26th street in said city. WHEREAS, It having been, and being hereby adjudged and determined, as established that the several lots hereinafter referred to have each been specially benefited by the full amount herein levied and assessed against each of said lots respectively, by reason of the paving and curbing of that part of Main street between the east side of 24th street and the west side of 26th street.

Therefore, for the purpose of paying the cost of said paving and curbing. SECTION 1. SECTION 2. That said special taxes levied and assessed on said lots shall become delinquent as follows: One tenth of the total amount so levied on each of said lots shall become delinquent in fifty days from the passage and approval of this ordinance, one tenth in one year, one tenth in two years, one tenth in three years, one tenth in four years, one tenth in five years, one tenth in six years, one tenth in seven years, one tenth in eight years, one tenth in nine years after said levy, and being in default of the passage and approval of this ordinance. Each of said installments, except the first, shall draw interest at the rate of seven per cent per annum from the time the levy foreclosed until the same shall become delinquent, and after the same shall become delinquent a penalty of five per cent per month shall be paid upon each delinquent installment.

SECTION 3. That the entire amount of tax so levied and assessed on any of said lots may be paid by the owner of any lot, or the entire equal pro rata proportion of said tax on any of said lots, may be paid by any person on any part of said lots within fifty days from said levy, and after the expiration of said time said lots shall be exempt from any lien or charge therefor.

SECTION 4. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage. Passed and approved February 14, A. D. 1889. (ATTEST) F. M. RICHEY, Mayor. W. K. FOX, City Clerk.
