THREE ships have been sent to Samoa

to the penitentiary for six years for stealing  
a bushel of coal, but the men who  
stole two congressional seats and a gov-  
ernorship have not been punished.

The farmers of Nebraska following  
the example of the farmers in Iowa pre-  
pare to resist the twine trust. The  
movement to oppose this monopoly is  
stained to assume a powerful influence  
through the agricultural states.

ALTHOUGH the republicans were beaten  
at the polls yesterday, THE HERALD will

THE war department is about to issue  
an order that will be received with ac-  
claim by the soldiers everywhere. It is  
to the effect that hereafter the weekly  
inspections shall be made on Saturday  
afternoon instead of on Sunday morning.  
Inspection day is the hardest in the week  
to the rank and file of the army, and  
especially to the "file." There is no  
earthly reason why the soldiers should  
be deprived of the Sabbath rest.

Ten delegates nominated by the  
people to represent the United States  
at the International Conference to be  
held at Washington this fall will have  
plenty of interesting and important work  
to do. The nations represented will be  
the United States, Mexico, the Central  
and South American Republics, Hayti,  
San Domingo and Brazil. The confer-  
ence was suggested by Mr. Blaine in  
1881, and the business to be transacted  
includes the practical discussion of sev-  
eral matters of more than usual impor-  
tance. Prominent among the subjects

will be proposals for the establishment  
of international arbitration, uniform  
coinage, weights and measures, customs  
and tariffs, and plans for the more fre-  
quent and convenient interchange of  
commerce. The programme is of al-  
most alarming proportions, but if only a  
small percentage of the suggestions bear  
fruit the convention will not have met  
in vain.—Globe-Democrat.

### THE PROGRESS OF THE SOUTH.

A few years ago the South bought of  
others all its hardware and agricultural  
implements. Now it realizes its wealth  
of coal and iron, and in three years has  
started 76 iron furnaces, 52 implement  
factories, and about 300 machine shops  
and foundries. Twenty thousand miles  
of railroad have been built in the South-  
ern states since 1880, and more than  
\$700,000,000 expended in building new  
roads and improving old ones. There  
are now in those states more than 300  
cotton mills using 1,800,000 spindles,  
against 180 mills and 700,000 spindles in  
1880. The value of cotton goods made  
here in 1888 was nearly \$50,000,000, as  
against \$21,000,000 in 1880. The value  
of the agricultural products of the South  
in 1888 was \$800,000,000, against \$570,  
000,000 in 1880. In 1880 the amount of  
grain raised in that section was 430,000,  
000 bushels, and in 1888 it was 620,000,  
000 bushels. More than a score of car  
and locomotive works in the South are  
now supplying rolling stock for the  
30,000 miles of railroad built since 1880;  
300 cannery factories have been opened  
in three years to use up Southern fruit;  
and glass, bricks, furniture, vehicles and  
a host of other articles are now being  
made at home out of the South's own  
raw materials. This is solid prosperity.  
This is substantial progress. This is  
raising the South from the dependent  
condition of a purely agricultural section  
to the independent manhood of a sym-  
metrically developed people. It carries  
out the American system of supplying  
some demands with home products, and  
insures for home products a profitable  
home demand.—American Economist.
