### MET FOR BUSINESS.

**The City Council Does a Great Amount of Municipal Managing.**

**No Harrassing Discussion.**  
Plattsmouth's aldermen assembled at the council chamber last night in regular session. The elements were somewhat inclement, but the quorum got there with stern business countenances, knowing that their mental qualities would be severely tried by the long routine of business before them. There were present Mayor Ritchey, Clerk Fox, Aldermen, Murphy, Dutton, McCallen, Shipman, Jones, Connor and Salisbury. Minutes of previous meeting were read and approved.

A communication praying for an extension of water mains north on Eleventh from Washington avenue, with at least two fire hydrants, was read and referred to committee on fire and water.

Petitions of saloon keepers; Hans Frahm, John Blake, Jos. J. McVey, Wm. Krecklow, Fred Goos, Gus Ave Lau & Claus Speck, Wm. Weber and Nick Cunningham, were referred to license committee.

Report of city treasurer for March showed a total on hand of cash and bills collectable of \$17,266.87, and was referred to finance committee.

Mr. Murphy moved the clerk be instructed to draw warrants for the salaries of mayor and council. Seconded. All Ayes. Clerk was also instructed to draw warrants for payment of Judges and clerks of election.

Judiciary committee introduced ordinance ordering the trees in front of lot 7 block 30 to be removed. Ordinance read second and third times and passed under suspension of rules.

An ordinance repealing a portion of a former fire ordinance to confine the fire limits to Main street from Second to Seventh, and north and south to the alleys between Main and Vine and Pearl streets, was read three times and passed under suspension of rules.

Special committee appointed to make a settlement with city clerk, reported amounts received for year from clerk \$602.00. Received and ordered placed on minutes.

A resolution was introduced by Salisbury authorizing and requiring the mayor to issue proclamation closing Second street from Main to Granite and accepting the new street from Main to Granite, on the B. & M. grounds, a per a former agreement with the company. Motion passed. Mr. Jones suggested that there ought to be surveying centres established over the city as a matter of convenience and economy. Mr. Murphy replied that Surveyor Madole had been instructed and paid to put in iron monuments for such purpose. Surveyor Schmidt stated he failed to find them or any record of them. On motion clerk was instructed to write to Mr. Madole and get any record he may have of the surveying centres established by him.

On motion the council proceeded to canvass the vote of the late city election. A committee of Messrs. Salisbury, Jones and Dutton was appointed to do the canvassing.

Report of committee received, and the men receiving the highest number of votes declared elected as members school board and city council and the clerk instructed to issue certificates of election to them.

Mayor reported that he had appointed Messrs. Wm. Wintersteen, C. H. Parmele, H. C. Ritchie, F. Carruth and J. W. Sage as appraisers of lot 11 block 72. Appraisers approved.

Motion passed ordering construction of sidewalk on north side of Granite street from Third to Fourth streets. Council adjourned.

### DISTRICT COURT.

**Closing of the March Term--Decrees of this Week.**

The spring term of the district court of Cass county closed yesterday evening, and verdicts were given in cases yesterday as follows:

W. H. Pickens vs. the Plattsmouth Investment Company. Court found for plaintiff in the amount of \$800, interest at 7 per cent.

Elizabeth Walker vs. Sheriff Cass county. Judgment in favor of defendant for costs.

Levi P. Patton vs. sheriff of Cass county. Verdict in favor of sheriff for costs.

The Western Horse and Cattle Ins. Co. vs. Henry F. Bunte et al. Motion to strike out irrelevant matter sustained.

Michael Archer vs. Sarah Archer. Defendant withdrew answer; verdict for costs to her.

Conrad Meisinger vs. John Frey, et al. Application to revoke order appointing guardian ad litem overruled.

Conrad Meisinger vs. sheriff of Cass county. Demurrer overruled; defendant given twenty days in which to answer.

Joshua Murray vs. Daniel Faust and Henry Clark. Dismissed.

Wm. Wagouer vs. E. G. Dovey & Son. In this case the court held the wages of plaintiff which had been garnished were exempt, and ordered released at defendant's expense.

Louis F. Kohrell vs. Chas. Harmon. Dismissed.

The Equitable Trust Co. vs. Jacob Grassman, Catharine Grassman, Richey Bros. E. G. Dovey & Son and the Philadelphia Mortgage and Trust Co. Court found there was due E. G. Dovey & Son \$1025, upon their mortgages lein as set forth in their cross claim, with 10% on decree. That there was also due Richey Bros. on their judgment lein \$51.57, costs \$2.10. Decree accordingly.

Marshall W. Smith vs. Geo. B. Walz and Mary Walz. Court found there was due plaintiff \$157, interest at 7%. Decree of foreclosure entered, and sale of mortgaged premises ordered.

The cases of Thos. H. Pollock and David McEntee vs. Plattsmouth Land and Investment Co. Court found in favor of defendants; for Pollock \$125, for McEntee \$225. Court adjourned sine die.

### A Little Previous.

The first new potatoes of the season were exhibited at *The Herald* office on Friday last by C. W. Cutrell, residing on the west part of town. The potatoes were about the size of a walnut, and Mr. Cutrell enjoyed a meal from them on Thursday. This beats all previous records for new potatoes in this latitude. The potatoes buried by that gentleman last fall in a hill near the house had sprouted and the crop of new potatoes was gathered from these sprouts. How ever if the potatoes had been planted the result would have been the same, as the weather during the past month was equal to such results.—Nemaha County Herald.
