Six tallies were here scored and King made a home run and brought in a man with a fly over the fence as did Wilson in the first inning. Plattsmouth finished the third inning with the same result of the other two and then followed three innings without any scores. ### BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Prof. Drummond Re-elected as  
Supt. and Teachers Selected.

Last night the board of education met in called session and transacted the following business, all members being present: Misses Olive Gass, Maggie Berry, May Berry, of this city were elected as teachers, and Miss Ethel Rannell, of Geneseo, Ill., was elected as assistant principal of the high school, and Miss Bessie Rannell, of the same place, to an intermediate position. The board then proceeded to ballot for superintendent. Thirteen ballots were cast, the last resulting, Drummond 4, Kauffman 2.

Miss Cora B. Brooks, of Mount Vernon, Iowa, was elected as a school teacher.

The board directed that all the teachers shall be examined, and must pass 75 in all the branches in which they expect to teach.

The board authorized the committee to do repairing on west Third ward school, high school and South Park buildings.

All the positions of teachers are now filled except principal. There is no applicant for the place yet.

### ONE YEAR LONGER.

A Pointer From a Citizen on the  
School Board's Selection of a Superintendent.

PLATTSMOUTH, June 19.—(Ed. Herald.)—Wholly on the grounds of sympathy, and not on any pretense that it was for the best interest of the schools of our city, the school board has seen fit to re-elect Drummond to the superintendency of our schools for another year with the understanding that this is to end his career in that position.

In view of the fact that the patrons of the schools by an overwhelming vote last spring indicated that they wanted a change, we think the board can scarcely justify its action in returning him for another year. The fact of buying property and building a big house should not be a sufficient consideration on which to retain a man in official position when a majority of the people desire a change, as is clearly the fact in this case. Indeed when any considerable minority of the patrons of the schools become dissatisfied and desire a change in the management of the schools it is an accepted maxim that the change should be made.

It is a notorious fact, susceptible of easy proof, that our schools are away below the standard of schools of cities and towns of this state and Iowa much smaller than Plattsmouth, and certainly the prospect for the coming year is not pleasing to those of our people who would like to see our schools placed on a footing commensurate with the importance of our city. Strange isn't it that a man should want to foist his services on an unwilling public as has been done in this case?

Some satisfaction may be obtained, however, in the fact that it is only for another year.
