CLAIMS IT WASN'T LEGAL.

In the Bond Case Plaintiff Attacks the Validity of an act of the Last Legislature.

They Make no Direct Charge but Wade into the Statute Under Which the Bonds Were Voted.

C. N. Baird et al vs. the Commissioners of Cass County.

The application made at Lincoln yesterday before Judge Field for a temporary injunction to enjoin the county commissioners from issuing the bonds to build a court house recently voted, was brought under the title of "C. N. Baird et al vs. the commissioners of Cass county." Mr. Baird is cashier of the First National bank at Weeping Water, while the et al is doubtless intended for various members of the Weeping Water town site company. No direct charges were made that would cause the court to blush, or wonder why the heathen rage and imagine vain things, but with a bare arm they plied the knife of dissection to the law and accused the last legislature of making an illegal amendment. Messrs. Woolley and Webster were attorneys for plaintiff. Woolley held his peace, however, and Mr. Webster done the talking. In their petition they attacked the validity of an act of the last legislature amending the second subdivision of section 26, chapter 19, of the statutes of Nebraska, which provides the duties of county boards in the erection of county buildings and makes a majority vote legal. On this charge they take three grounds.

First: The act (title not broad enough) does not include this subject of county buildings.

Second: This amendatory act just passed does not refer to the section to be amended, as provided by section 11 of article 3 of the statutes.

Third: The provision in that subject provision as to voting bonds was not germane to the subject matter of the section which purports to have been amended.

And the second subdivision as amended is in conflict with section 20 of the same chapter, which provides for a two-thirds vote and that it does not purport to repeal said section 20.

A. N. Sullivan, Byron Clark and Matt Gering all made remarks in reply to the charges by Webster. The application with the petition prayed for a temporary injunction, which was probably granted to-day, and it is the usual practice to allow a temporary injunction unless the claim it is brought for is frivolous. However, the parties have entered into a stipulation to try the case in the courts in this city on a demurrer on the 8th of July, and the party defeated will go to the supreme court from which a hearing can be had by September.

COUNCIL MEETING.

Making the Tax Levy for the City for the Coming Year.

At the adjourned session of the city council held last night there were present Mayor Richey, Clerk Fox, and all councilmen.

The finance committee presented a resolution levying upon the dollar valuation of the city as follows: General fund, 5 1/2 mills; B. & M. R. R., 2 1/2 mills; high school bond, 4 1/2 mills; streets, grading and bridging, 5 mills; fire hydrant rental, 6 1/2 mills; Kearton bonds, 1 1/2 mills; storm water sewer, 4 mills; intersection paving, 1 mill; fire and water, 1 mill; gas and electric lighting, 5 mills, making a total of 36 mills. This resolution was adopted. The levy is for the year commencing on the first Monday in August.

On motion of Mr. Murphy the board of public works was instructed to move the dirt on Marble street, west of Sixth street and on the east side of Sixth slope the sidewalk, so that the approaches from either side will conform with the grade of the street.

Committee on streets, alleys and bridges was instructed to widen Sixth street, between Vine and Oak, at once.

A communication from Engineer Rosewater, of Omaha, was read, and on motion of Mr. Salisbury, the clerk was instructed to forward Mr. Rosewater a copy of the report which he made to the council last fall, as regards public work done in this city.

Mr. Murphy moved that the committee to open Ninth street be authorized to condemn and purchase land, if necessary, to open the street into South Park. Motion passed. The road is to be opened along the old Billings road. Adjourned.

THE CITY AND THE SEWER.

The Council Restrained by Injunction from Paying the Guarantee Reserve.

It was generally understood that at last night's meeting of the city council the \$1,763 retained as a guarantee from Contractor Haubens & Shelton till the sewer work should be thoroughly tested would come up for allowance. But it did not, the council being restrained by injunction. The case briefly is: The contract under which the sewer was built made Haubens & Shelton liable to protect the city from any damages to come from the construction of the sewer, to any property or improvements, and a bond of \$15,000 secured the faithful performance of the contract; Messrs. Theo. Oleson, Nathan Shelton and G. H. Ballou being the bondsmen. The council withheld a twentieth part of the total cost of the sewer as a security until the sewer should be proven thoroughly efficient in service and substantially built. This has been done and the money was due on June 15; but, meanwhile, damage claims of \$1,200 by H. Boeck, \$300 by E. G. Doyce & Son and \$50 by A. W. White were filed with the city clerk, and Mr. Boeck's claim carried into the court.

To thoroughly secure themselves, the bondsmen filed a petition in the district court, praying for an injunction against the council, forbidding the payment of the reserve fund until all claims were properly adjusted as provided in the contract; and in the absence from the city of Judges Chapman and Field the injunction was granted by County Judge Russell. In case the money had been paid, the plaintiff bondsmen would have been without immediate security for damages that might have been assessed to them.

STILL CIRCULATING.

A Scene from Plattsmouth's Tragic Life Going Around the World Without Any Date.

In the history of Plattsmouth there was one incident that is still fresh in the memories of many. It happened three years ago and the end of it is uncertain. It is now traveling without any date, but for the nature of the story, it holds an amazing amount of truth in its details. The most recent publication is under date of June 20, 1889 in the Lake Village Advocate in New Hampshire, and it will doubtless cross the ocean. The Advocate has it as follows, published under the head of "Lodge Room Gossip." The following is taken from Chairman C. H. Hamilton's report of the committee on foreign correspondence of Wisconsin.

A striking feature of this journal (of Nebraska) occurs in the decrology department, which is usually the last place to look for something funny; and if the province of wit be to excite pleasure by means of surprise, this is certainly the funniest thing we have seen for a long while. We quote it verbatim:

Resurrected:—"Rev." W. G. Hearn, who deposited his wardrobe on the banks of the Missouri river at Plattsmouth, and disappeared, creating the impression that he had found a grave beneath its turbid waters, has returned to this mundane sphere. In the printed Journal of proceedings of 1887 he is classed among those "At Rest." Recent intelligence from Illinois discloses the fact that Hearn has resumed activity in that grand jurisdiction under an assumed name.

"We sat upon Missouri's bank Hot tears our cheeks did burn; In anguish wept and cried aloud "O, what's the matter with Hearn?"

"The brisk winds of November Scattered the sands so light, As the wild waves gently murmured "He's all right."

A SMALL BLAZE.

But it Calls out the Citizens and Fire Department.

At 9:33 o'clock this morning, an alarm of fire from the third ward called out a large number of citizens and firemen. The cause of the alarm was the burning of a small house on Ninth street, beyond Gold, belonging to Mr. Billings and occupied by Mr. and Mrs. E. M. Gray, who is employed in the hammar gang, in the shops. Mrs. Gray was in the house working and not aware of fire overhead till alarmed by neighbors. At the time of the alarm the whole garret was on fire. Neighboring men and women soon emptied the two rooms of the house of their contents, and an alarm telephoned to Main street. The building was two blocks from any hydrant, but the Second and Third ward hose carts were soon at hand and by coupling their hose had a stream of water flowing on the flames five minutes after the ringing of the fire bell, and in five more minutes the fire was out; the roof and upper part of the walls being burned. An unoccupied house north of the burned one might have been consumed had it not been for the hose service. Damages were probably \$150.
