GIBSON RETURNS.

The Whisky Trust Secretary
Gives a \$25,000 Bond.
UNPROVOKED DOUBLE MURDER.

A Nebraska Slayer Acquitted on Plea of
Self-Defense—A Chief of Police Robbed
—Highwayman at Work on a Public
Thoroughfare—A Double Lynching.

CHICAGO, Feb. 19.—George J. Gibson,
the ex-secretary of the whisky trust,
concerning whose whereabouts there
has been so much speculation, turned
up in Chicago. Mr. Gibson gave bail in
the sum of \$25,000 to answer to the in-
dictments brought against him by the
grand jury. The ex-secretary ar-
rived in Chicago on the 6:25 train from
Peoria. He went to a hotel, took break-
fast, and then with two friends, Thos.
Hutchinson and George B. Burrows,
both whisky trust men, strolled over to
the criminal court building and asked
to be shown to Judge Shepard's room.
The judge himself was there early and
in anticipation of having to receive Gib-
son's bond.

"You will be required to furnish bail
to the amount of \$25,000 on these
charges," said Judge Shepard, after the
accused man's lawyer had
looked over the indictments. "Are you
prepared to do so?"
"Yes, sir," said Gibson. "Mr. Hutch-
inson and Mr. Burrows here will sign
my bonds." The two gentlemen
stepped forward, each scheduled prop-
erty to the value of \$100,000 and over,
and they affixed their names to the
bonds. This formality over, Mr. Gib-
son and his party left the criminal court
building. The accused ex-secretary
looked pale and worn, as though he had
spent a good many restless nights of
late.

"I can't say a word about this matter
at present," he said to a reporter who
questioned him. "When the proper
time comes I will talk, but not until
then."

Double Murder on a Railroad Train.
BALD KNOB, Ark., Feb. 19.—A crazy
passenger on the south-bound Iron
Mountain train fatally shot two unof-
fending people at noon. Just as the
train pulled out J. W. Granger of Vin-
centes, Ind., walked from the ladies' car
into the adjoining sleeper and delibera-
tely shot and killed a drummer named
Isidore Meyer. He then turned upon
the Pullman conductor, E. W. Leach,
and emptied another chamber of his re-
volver into Leach's body, killing him
instantly. The shooting was entirely
unprovoked.

Held Up on a Public Highway.
PUEBLO, Colo., Feb. 19.—M. D. Crow,
ex-postmaster of this city and a promi-
nent real estate man, was held up a
little before 7 o'clock last evening on
Third street, within half a block of
Santa Fe avenue, just as he was leaving
his home. There were two men engaged
in the job, one of whom held a revolver
at Mr. Crow's head, while the other took
from him a gold watch, a diamond stud
and his pocketbook, containing money
and papers. Mr. Crow's loss amounts
to \$600 or \$700.

In Self Defense.
HARRISON, Neb., Feb. 19.—The case
of the state against Henry Cocker for
the killing of a negro soldier in a negro
bar near Fort Robinson in November
last, was given to the jury at 2 p. m.
Between 3 and 6 o'clock that evening
they brought in a verdict of not guilty.
The testimony showed that the killing
was done in self defense.

A Double Lynching.
JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Feb. 19.—Two
prisoners, a white man and a negro,
who were under arrest for complicity in
numerous assaults, were taken from the
county jail at Gainesville, late at night
and hanged. A mob of 300 or more as-
sembled about midnight, overpowered
an guard, took the prisoners from their
cells and hanged them to a tree near by.

A Murderer Resisted.
COLUMBIAS, O., Feb. 19.—Stanley C.
Jones of Lake county, sentenced to hang
March 6, for the murder of a Painesville
lawyer, was granted a respite by Gov-
ernor Campbell until May 8. The ex-
tension is granted in order that the con-
demned man may have a chance to
secure a representation of his case to the
state board of pardons.

Cracksmen Make a Hunt.
LAWRENCE, Kan., Feb. 19.—Safe
blowers cracked the safe of C. E. Easton,
a merchant of Overbrook. Three hun-
dred dollars was taken, but several hun-
dred dollars in notes and checks were
undisturbed.

Succi Challenged to Fast to a Finish.
DETROIT, Mich., Feb. 19.—Arthur W.
G. Wullmeu, who recently completed
a thirty days' fast in a local dime mu-
seum, issued a challenge to Senor Succ
or any other faster with an official fast-
ing record, to fast to a finish for
\$15,000 a side.

Surplus Corn in Kansas.
ARCHISON, Kan., Feb. 19.—The com-
mercial agent of the Missouri Pacific at
this point says there is a great deal of
corn and wheat stored away in western
Kansas, which was raised in 1899, now
being sent to the markets in the east.
