Boyd's Appeal. The supreme court of Nebraska yesterday reviewed the writ of error allowed by Judge Brewer of the supreme court of the United States in the Thayer-Boyd case. The document closes with this command:

"We being willing that error, if any hath been, should be duly corrected and full and speedy justice done to the parties aforesaid in this behalf, do command you, if judgment be therein given, that then under your seal, distinctly and openly, you send the record and aforesaid, with all things concerning the same, to the supreme court of the United States, together with this writ, so that you have the same at Washington within thirty days from the date hereof in the said supreme court, to be then and there held, that the record and proceedings aforesaid being inspected, the said supreme court may cause further to be done therein to correct that error, what of right, and according to the laws and customs of the United States, should be done."
