Mr. Blaine's Representative. A Washington special to the Sun announces that the Hon. John W. Foster will act as the diplomatic adviser of the President until Secretary of State Blaine is able to resume his official duties. Mr. Foster is well fitted by experience for the duties to which it is understood he will be assigned at the request of Mr. Blaine. He is a native of Indiana, is 55 years of age, a graduate of by profession. He entered the Union army during the late war as a major and rose to the rank of but a remedy to cure. After the war he edited a Republican paper at Knoxville, Tenn., and was for a Toledo. Ohio. while postmaster at that place. In 1873 he was sent as Minister to Mexico by President Grant, and was reappointed by President Hayes in 1880. In March of that year he was transferred to Russia and held that mission until 1881, when he resigned to attend to private business. On his return to this country Mr. Foster established himself in practice in international cases in Washington, acting as a council for foreign legations, before court of commission, in arbitrations' etc. President Arthur appointed him Minister to Spain, and he served from Febuary, 1883, till March, 1885, when he resigned and returned to the United States, having negotiated an important commercial treaty with the Spanish Government. This treaty elicited general discussion and was strongly opposed in the Senate. That body failed to confirm it, and it was afterward withdrawn by President Cleveland fo
