The evident delight with which the democratic press mentions Blaine as being a mental and physical wreck is absolutely ghoulish. The facts are, however, that Mr. Blaine is still able to thwart the enemies of his country, be they foreigners in truth or American free traders.

THREE thousand immigrants landed in New York last Sunday and half of them were Italians. The New Orleans episode, unfortunately, seems to have only advertised our country in Italy, so that we are to be cursed by an influx of her poverty stricken population, a majority of whom are without money and devoid of honor.

THE scheme of the peoples party to have the government loan money on real estate at two per cent interest, is silly and impracticable enough to sink the new organization if there were not other principles embraced equally as vicious. No wonder governor Todd wants to borrow money on his big farms at 2 per cent. He would turn round and re-loan it to his neighbors who did not own land at from 10 to 15 per cent, that's the kind of patriot governor Todd is, and we miss our hearing if a majority of the peoples party are not of the same feather.

AN ALLIANCE TRUTH

THE people's party leaders say they are going to make a lively canvass in Kentucky this year. They will do nothing of the sort. The democracy is the party which would be hurt by a demonstration of that kind in Kentucky, and the people's party has no stomach for a fight against the democracy. The Peppers, Donnellys and Taubenecks will confine their political activities strictly to republican localities.—Ex.

It will be observed that the decree of the Brazilian Government with regard to its legations in foreign countries places the United States at the head of the list. This is the first formal recognition of the important fact that ours is the foremost nation in the world. And since it comes unsought from the greatest of South America Republics we feel as though our own estimation of the greatness of Uncle Sams dominions was being shared by intelligent foreigners. We hope the South American Republic may continue to grow until she is the equal in power and wealth of her Northern sister.

Mr. Blaine's Representative. A Washington special to the Sun announces that the Hon. John W. Foster will act as the diplomatic adviser of the President until Secretary of State Blaine is able to resume his official duties. Mr. Foster is well fitted by experience for the duties to which it is understood he will be assigned at the request of Mr. Blaine. He is a native of Indiana, is 55 years of age, a graduate of Harvard University, and a lawyer by profession. He entered the Union army during the late war as a major and rose to the rank of brigadier general. After the war he edited a Republican paper at Knoxville, Tenn., and was for a while postmaster at that place. In 1873 he was sent as Minister to Mexico by President Grant, and was reappointed by President Hayes in 1880. In March of that year he was transferred to Russia and held that mission until 1881, when he resigned to attend to private business. On his return to this country Mr. Foster established himself in practice in international cases in Washington, acting as a council for foreign legations, before court of commission, in arbitrations, etc. President Arthur appointed him Minister to Spain, and he served from February, 1883, till March, 1885, when he resigned and returned to the United States, having negotiated an important commercial treaty with the Spanish Government. This treaty elicited general discussion and was strongly opposed in the Senate. That body failed to confirm it, and it was afterward withdrawn by President Cleveland for

reconsideration. Some weeks later Mr. Foster was instructed to return to Spain to reopen negotiations for a modified treaty. This mission was, however, unsuccessful, and Mr. Foster remained abroad but a few months. Recently Mr. Foster was again sent to Spain and negotiated a commercial treaty, the acceptance of which is now pending.

PEOPLE AND EVENTS.

Amherst College will spend \$100,000 of the gifts recently made her, in building physical and chemical laboratories.

West Point will graduate a class of sixty-five. There are six Illinois boys. Struggle for first place is between Sewell, of Kentucky, and Crosby, appointed by President Cleveland.

The University of Pennsylvania talks of lengthening its medical course to four years. This calls for an endowment fund of \$500,000, to which, on certain conditions, Provost William Pepper is willing to subscribe \$50,000.

Harvard has decided to count work done in the summer schools as regular term work for the A. B. degree. This makes the summer schools an integral part of the University. This concession makes it easier to get a degree in three years.

Butler expects a full house. He will issue his autobiography and reminiscences in German and French as well as English. The old veteran has already said there are sensations in this book. Evidently he means his mines shall explode on two continents simultaneously.

One of William K. Vanderbilt's greatest hobbies is the raising of choice strains of poultry. He has just given a contract for the erection on his beautiful estate, at Oakdale, a poultry house to cost \$15,000. It will be 385 feet long, and it will contain, in conjunction with original ideas of Mr. Vanderbilt's, every improvement known to professional breeders.

It is reported in London that in spite of the New Orleans uprising 100,000 Italians will come to this country this year.

Mr. Kozaki, of Harvard divinity school, is not the only Japanese who will take part in commencement exercises this year. Masayoshi Takaki, of the same nationality, and a student in the Syracuse University, has been selected by the seniors for the oration. His command of English composition is said to be excellent. He is editor of the University Herald.
