THE RECIPROCITY QUESTION IN ENGLAND.

Dispatches from England indicate that the British government is somewhat disturbed, in regard to the reciprocity policy which the United States has inaugurated. The fact that the commercial treaty between the United States and Brazil will admit cotton manufactures from this country into Brazil, at rates of duty 25 per cent less than those imposed upon similar goods sent from Great Britain, seems to have stirred Lancashire profoundly. British dispatches state that England sends every year to Brazil about \$31,250,000 worth, and that more than \$12,500,000 worth of this aggregate represents the value of cotton goods alone. Urgent efforts are being made, according to recent dispatches, to induce the British Ministry to take some steps for the protection of the trade of that country with Brazil, particularly in the matter of cotton goods.

The difficulty is to see what lies within the power of the British Government to do. Its policy already admits free of duty a large share of the exportable products of Brazil, and the necessities of the revenue affect in a peculiar degree the possibilities of modifying the present system, even if it could be done with advantage as respects any important Brazilian product. But Brazil has scarcely any important product to sell upon which the British government now imposes any duty whatever. Coffee and cocoa are the only dutiable products imported from Brazil by Great Britain to any extent, and of these British supplies are mainly from other countries. Nor is it practicable for Great Britain, in

harmony with its long established commercial policy, to threaten the imposition of any duties upon products from Brazil alone, while similar products from other countries are admitted free of duty.—New York Daily Commercial Bulletin.

UNDERGROUND TRAVEL BY THE GREATHEAD SYSTEM.

The cars are supplied with longitudinal seats, lit by electricity, and luxuriously cushioned, the passengers facing each other. The locomotive is an electric motor, picking up its electricity from a central rail through which the electric current is conducted by a copper wire; and inasmuch as, for each track, there is a separate tunnel only a trifle larger than the train (which fills almost the whole of the annual space, only at stations) each train acts as a piston, driving out, from station to station, the air through which the preceding train passed. The stations are connected with the open air and are not more than three-quarters of a mile apart; any foul air which gathers in the tunnel is thus expelled by each passing train. Indeed, the air in the tunnel is of a more equable temperature, and is kept more constantly moved and freshened, than the air on the surface; and frequently on dark and murky days it has been noticed that air and atmosphere, strange as it may appear, are far more pleasant in the tunnel than on the street surface.—Simon Stieren in the August Forum.

The July report of the statistician or U.S. department of agriculture, devoted to areas and conditions of growing crops, places the United States acreage of corn, compared with 1000 last year, at 1083, potatoes 1023, tobacco 1026. As to condition July 1, compared with the average crop for ten years past, corn is estimated at 928 per cent; wheat 94.1 rye 93.9; oats 87.6; barley 90.9; potatoes 95.3; tobacco 91.1; clover 89.3; timothy 87.4; and pasture 92.3. The average weight of fleece from this year's wool clip is 4.9 pounds. General improvement is reported in the crop conditions of all Europe countries except Russia. In India both the area and the yield are slightly less than was expected two months ago.

SENATOR PEPPER should take a day off and correct the statistics that he uses in his calamity speeches. There are not 9,000,000 mortgaged homes in the United States, as he asserts. The total number, according to the census returns, is only 2,250,000, or less than one-third of his estimate, and it is absurd for him to go on making such a misrepresentation.
