REPUBLICAN STATE CONVENTION.
The republican electors of the state of Nebraska are requested to send delegates from their several counties, to meet in convention in the city of Lincoln, Thursday, September 24, 1891, at 10 o'clock a. m., for the purpose of placing in nomination candidates for one associate justice of the supreme court, and two members of the board of regents of the state university, and to transact such other business as may be presented to the convention.

In a report dated New York, May 8th, Mr. Consul-General Booker thus refers to the effect of the McKinley tariff upon the United States worsted and woolen industries: "The worsted goods industry has been marked by fresh life, since the new tariff has to a great extent cut off the importation of the lowest grades of such goods. All the old factories have started up, and are making goods on safe orders; and new mills are being erected by European and British capitalists with a view to manufacturing a finer class of dress goods, &c., than ever before has been produced in this country. The woolen goods industry, apart from ladies' cloths, does not show any perceptible signs of improvement, but keeps on a slow, steady gait, apart from carpetings and woolen underwear. Both of the latter industries have been unusually busy during the last six months at fairly profitable prices.—London Economist.

EASTERN democratic organs can continue to sneer about the "mortgaged west," "the corn burners," "grasshopper eaten," "cyclone swept," and all that, but don't forget to send along the thousand dollar bills to pay for the crops, and plenty of them. The grasshopper terms this year are C. O. D. F. O. B.
If Uncle Sam were to get into any trouble an army could be organized in ten days from the ranks of the G. A. R. which, without a drill, could lick any army organized on this green earth. They are old and gray-headed, but they would be there all the same.—Inter Ocean.

MR. MILLS wants the Democrats to straddle the silver issue in 1892, as they did the tariff in former years but the Republicans will expose and defeat this cowardice and duplicity as they did the other.

The appearance of Senator Poynter in Lincoln yesterday caused the World-Herald and a few others to think he was going to seize the governors chair and call a special session of the legislature, as Governor Thayer was out of the state; but all of their scare and hurrah is blown to the wind as Lieutenant Governor Tom Majors is at his home near Peru attending to his own business and as long as he is in the state Poynter or no one else can step over him and call a special session while the governor is away from the state. Tom Majors is expected to be in Lincoln to-morrow to attend to some matters from the state and Senator Poynter's gubernatorial aspiration will end.

The stock of grain in regular warehouses in Chicago last Saturday evening were 3,058,341 bushels of wheat, 1,300,071 bushels of corn, 714,793 bushels of oats, 257,845 bushels of rye, and 832 bushels of barley. In private store there were about 94,700 bushels of wheat, 49,000 bushels of corn, and 69,000 bushels of oats. Total of 3,445,572 bushels of all kinds of grains, against 9,833,922 bushels a year ago. The Secretary of the Chicago Board of Trade reports the visible supply of grain in the United States and Canada for the same date as 16,767,937 bushels of wheat, 3,872,700 bushels of corn, 2,072,718 bushels of oats, 584,019 bushels of rye, and 71,633 bushels of barley, against 18,463,048 bushels wheat 11,049,079 bushels of corn, 2,530,428 bushels of oats, 464,013 bushels of rye, and 399,687 bushels of barley for the corresponding time last year. Compared with a week ago there were increase of 1,967,665 bushels of wheat, 837,984 bushels of corn, 303,818 bushels of oats, and 302,773 bushel of rye, and a decrease of 3,068 bushels of barley.

THERE is a parrot in St. Louis which exclaims, whenever a man enters the room: "You're drunk, sir, and had better go away. I don't want to see you till you're over it." People wonder how the bird catches on, but the explanation is simple; it doesn't know how to say anything else, and of course in making the remark to every man it frequently gets near home. One gentleman who called thought it was the lady of the house speaking, and rushed out of the parlor. She sat down to write a note of explanation to him, when to her amazement a servant brought her a note from the gentleman she was writing to, in which he stated that he acknowledged with humility that he had perhaps taken too much wine with his dinner, but had hoped on calling on her that she would not have detected it. As she had done so, however, he offered his most abject apologies and a prayer for forgiveness.

WHY HES A PROTECTIONIST.
Ex-Congress Perkins, of Kansas, states these clear and forcible reasons for the faith that is in him: "I am a protectionist because I am an American. We should have free trade among ourselves because we were one flag and we are citizens of a common country. But the man who builds no houses here, who pays no taxes here, who employs no laborers here, who does nothing to contribute to our growth and to prosperity, who lives abroad beyond the seas, whence he desires to bring his products, either farm or manufactured, into this great American market in competition with ours, he should pay for the privilege; and when he has paid for the privilege we will cover the money into the treasury of the United States, and with it we will cancel our obligations and carry on the concerns of government. And I would do this in the name of patriotism and my country because I believe it right."
