REPUBLICAN STATE CONVENTION.

The republican electors of the state of Nebraska are requested to send delegates from their several counties, to meet in convention in the city of Lincoln, Thursday, September 24, 1891, at 10 o'clock a. m., for the purpose of placing in nomination candidates for one associate justice of the supreme court, and two members of the board of regents of the state university, and to transact such other business as may be presented to the convention.

THE APPOINTMENT
The several counties are entitled to representation as follows, being based upon the vote cast for Hon. Geo. H. Hastings, for attorney-general in 1890, giving one delegate-at-large to each county, and one for each 150 votes and the major fraction thereof:

THE MISSISSIPPI OUTRAGE.

The Mississippi constitution, as amended recently, works like a charm. It has reduced the negro vote by about 90,000 throughout the State, and has left but one county with a negro majority. In Lowndes County, where there are five negroes to one white resident, the registration stands 200 whites to one negro. To what further extent the negro vote may be reduced when the educational test is applied is conjectured; it may be guessed at least 10,000 more.

The total vote of Mississippi at the last Presidential election was 115,807; about 5,000 negroes who then voted henceforth will be eliminated from the list of factors, 10,000 more may be prevented by operation of the educational clause, which soon is to come into operation; it can not be supposed that less than 10,000 whites who hitherto have exercised the right of suffrage will be disfranchised by the educational test, for Mississippi disputes with Louisiana the disgraceful title of the most ignorant State in the Union. Here, then, is a reduction of 25,000 from voting force of 1888; 60,000 may be taken as the number of voters required to give Mississippi two Senators and seven Representatives in Congress. But New Jersey cast 269,103 votes to gain the same number of Senators and Representatives New Hampshire casts 56,540 votes at a Presidential election, and is represented by but two Congressmen, while Mississippi's 90,000 voters are to be represented by seven. Nebraska's 215,000 voters elect but three Congressmen, while Mississippi's 90,000 are to elect seven. Minnesota's 240,293 voters elect five Congress

284,588 voters; Mississippi is to have the same number for its 90,000. Clearly, at this rate 200,000 of the Kansas voters are left without representation, for if seven Congressmen to 90,000 voters be the standard in Mississippi, it ought to be the standard in Kansas, and on such a basis Kansas should have twenty-one Representatives to Mississippi's seven.

The injustice of such a distribution of Congressional representation is too plain for comment. It is of itself a demand for restriction of the right of representation to the actual number of voters in a state. The Congressional delegation of Mississippi is an incarnate fraud. Inter Ocean.

THE big twelve-inch gun manufactured in the United States out of American material is such a pronounced success that the government has ordered the construction of 100 of them right away. The defensive weapons were provided for by the last congress, and form an item in the appropriation bill that cannot be objected to by the most virulent opponent of the "billion dollar congress" in the sea coast cities. The penetrating power of these guns is marvellous. One hundred of them of them suitably placed at the entrance of our principal harbors will be able to pull the teeth of a good many hostile iron-clads. Lincoln Journal.

THE state election last Monday in Kentucky proved conclusively that the peoples party was not in it. The state went through the motions of electing a legislature, governor and other state officers, but as a matter of course the democratic state ticket was elected. It always is down there.

NEW bank-note paper has been adopted by the treasury department. This conveys an important warning to Merchants and bankers who have deceived themselves with the reason that the silk-thread could not be counterfeited.

THERE is no more state elections till the 3rd day of November, Kentucky and Rhode Island have already held their elections.
