THE WINNERS NAMED

All Harmonious, and in the Field to Win.
The Republican Party of Cass County Names a Splendid Ticket for the Consideration of the Voters at the Fall Election.

The republican county convention which convened at Louisville, Saturday, was one of the largest, most enthusiastic and humorous conventions ever held by the party in Cass county.
At 11 a. m. R. S. Wilkinson, chairman county central committee, called the meeting to order and Dr. M. M. Butler of Weeping Water was chosen temporary chairman and David Miller of Plattsmouth temporary secretary. Dr. Butler, upon assuming his position as presiding officer, in a neat little speech, exhorted the convention to nominate a clean ticket, worthy the support of the party in all sections of the county. The doctor was frequently applauded.
On motion the following delegates were appointed as a committee on credentials: M. B. Murphy, S. English, J. Robinson.
On motion the following were appointed as a committee on order of business: A. J. Graves, A. P. Woodward, C. A. Webster.
On motion the convention adjourned until 1 o'clock.
Upon re-assembling, the report of the committee on credentials, with the recommendation that votes by proxy be admitted—making in all 152 votes—was adopted.
On motion delegates present from each precinct were allowed to cast the full vote, in the event that the precinct was not represented by proxy.
The report of the committee on permanent organization, that the temporary chairman be made permanent, was adopted.
The committee on order of business recommended that the candidates be nominated in the following order: County clerk, treasurer, sheriff, county judge, clerk district court, county superintendent of schools, coroner, surveyor, delegates to the state convention, delegates to the judicial convention. On motion the report was adopted.
The selection of the county commissioner was left with the first district. After quite a lengthy discussion as to the time that the first district should select its candidate and several amendments to the motion proposed, the matter was laid upon the table.
The chair next announced that the convention would proceed to the nomination of candidates in the order designated by the report as adopted.
Frank Dickson, of Plattsmouth, being the only nominee, was unanimously declared the nominee by acclamation.
L. C. Eickhoff being the only candidate for treasurer was nominated by acclamation.
For the office of sheriff the following names were presented: Thos. Williams of Plattsmouth precinct; Geo. Edson, Rock Bluffs; A. P. Woodward, Weeping Water; David Woodward, of Weeping Water.
After two ballots were taken re-

sulting in no choice, the names of Thos. Williams and A. P. Woodward were withdrawn from the contest. The third ballot resulted in the nomination of Geo. Edson by a vote of 97 1/2 to 53 1/2. On motion the nomination of Edson was made unanimous.
Calvin Russell, of Weeping Water, was unanimously declared the nominee for county judge, by acclamation.
For clerk the names of A. Salisbury, of Plattsmouth, A. L. Timlin, of Weeping Water; H. L. Lloyd, of Union. On the second ballot Salisbury was declared the nominee. On motion the nomination of Salisbury was made unanimous.
The names of A. J. Graves, of Plattsmouth, and J. E. Leyda, of Weeping Water precinct, were presented. J. E. Leyda was nominated on the first ballot.
J. I. Unruh, the present incumbent, and Henry Beck, both of this city, were presented for coroner. Mr. Unruh receiving a majority was declared the nominee.
A. C. Mayes was nominated for county surveyor by acclamation.
A. B. Todd was re-nominated for county commissioner from the first district by acclamation.
R. B. Windham introduced the following resolution:
RESOLVED, That in the person of Hon. M. B. Reese, ex-chief justice of Nebraska, we recognize a man eminently fitted for the position of associate justice of the supreme court, both in point of legal attainment and moral stamina. Therefore, be it further
Resolved, That it is the expressed wish of this convention assembled, as it is in the interests of the republican party and the great state of Nebraska, that the Cass county delegation be and is hereby instructed to cast the full vote for Hon. M. B. Reese for associate justice of the supreme court and use all honorable means to secure his nomination.
Mr. Windham, in a forcible speech, moved the adoption of the resolution. M. B. Murphy was a friend of Judge Reese, but being opposed to sending instructed delegates, moved as an amendment that the motion be divided and that each paragraph be voted upon separately. The amendment was then taken up and lost. A motion to lay on the table was lost. The original motion to adopt was then carried unanimously, demonstrating conclusively that Judge Reese has a friend in the republican party of Cass county.
On motion each ward and precinct were permitted to name a member of a committee, the duty of which shall be to select fourteen delegates to the state and judicial convention.
The committee selected the following delegates to attend the state convention: S. S. English, Geo. W. Clark, Andy Christenson, John Clements, Geo. D. Matherson, Jas. M. Drake, I. N. Woodford, C. L. Graves, H. Eikenbary, Jas. Hall, J. A. Davis, Wash Smith, S. W. Orton, Jas. Robertson.
The following were selected delegates to the judicial convention: J. K. Stucker, S. S. Brown, Isaac Pollard, Sam Barker, J. H. Hall, Anderson Root, A. J. Graves, N. R. Hobbs, Geo. Findley, Orlando Teft, J. Q. Adams, A. L. Timblin, J. H. Haldeman.
The following resolution was introduced and adopted:
RESOLVED, By the republican county committee assembled, That the members of the county central committee be and are hereby instructed to fill all vacancies in the nomination of candidates for the several county offices that may occur, by reason of death of candidates, removal from county or for any other cause.
The following was also unanimously adopted.
RESOLVED, That the eminent ability and fearless integrity of the Hon. S. M. Chapman as evidenced by his course on the bench makes it the duty as well as the interest of the people of this judicial district to elect him to the position he has ably filled during his term of office.
The names of Orlando Teft and M. B. Murphy were presented for chairman of the county central committee. Mr. Teft received a majority of votes cast and was declared elected. On motion Mr. Murphy the election of Mr. Teft was made unanimous.

The following were chosen as central committeemen for the first district of county commissioners: First ward, Byron Clark; Second ward, Jesse Root; Third ward, M. B. Murphy; Fourth ward, Ed Green; Fifth ward, A. J. Graves; Plattsmouth precinct, Henry Eikenbary.
The committee elected Henry Eikenbary chairman and Jesse Root secretary.
Like all convention, in which the party represented was in the race to win, there was quite a spirited contest for some of the offices, but all were willing to abide by the decision of the majority, and harmony and good feeling prevailed.
The entire ticket is worthy of the full support of the party and with this able corps of officers at the helm the affair of Cass county will be entrusted to good men.

Convention Notes.
The usual remark was, that the republicans had an exceptionally strong ticket.
Dr. Butler as a presiding officer is a success. He presides with dignity, impartiality, and decision are rendered in accordance with established rules of parliamentary law.
M. D. Paik was down in the west end of the county "making hay," but owing to the rain in the afternoon, he had an opportunity of attending the convention as a looker-on.
A great many were surprised that such a warm feeling existed between the different sections of the county. It plainly proves that the republicans propose to lay aside petty side issues and work in unison, which means success to the entire ticket.
The speech of Hon. R. B. Windham in support of his resolution, was a forcible one, and had a telling effect upon the convention. Mr. Windham is well informed in regard to the meritorious services rendered by Judge Reese and his just claims upon the republicans of Cass county.
When Dr. Butler, in this speech upon taking the chair, referred to Mayor McKinley, he was greeted cheers and loud applause, thus indicating that in the future as in the past, the principle of protection, in its true sense will continue to be a shining star in the republican banner.
After the passage of Windham's resolution to instruct for Judge Reese, a prominent gentleman of Plattsmouth who was a delegate to the Hastings convention two years ago, with six proxies, all of which were cast against Judge Reese, was heard to remark that he had been ashamed of himself ever since. This indicated that he was now a Reese man.
