THE REPUBLICAN PLATFORM.
The republican party of the state
of Nebraska gives renewed expres-
sion of its devotion to the princi-
ples of the republican party and de-
clares that those principles, as ex-
pressed by the national republican
convention, should be the strong
point of union between all republi-
cans in the state of Nebraska.

We congratulate the people upon
the marvelous prosperity attending
the development and growth of the
state of Nebraska during its twenty-
four years of statehood under re-
publican administration, and which
has brought us to the front rank
among the leading states of the
union, and we can fearlessly assert
that no state which has been con-
trolled by democratic power during
any considerable time of the same
period, can compare with us in the
economical management of public
affairs, in the rapid ratio of increase
in population, wealth and general
prosperity, notwithstanding the
fact that those are within the
borders of the same a number of
dissatisfied persons who took ad-
vantage of the general financial de-
pression which swept over the en-
tire country to pave their way into
temporary prominence by declaim-
ing against the welfare of our peo-
ple and shandering the fair name of
our state. The rains from heaven
and the rich soil, vigorously culti-
vated by the energetic hands of our
farmers, have produced such boun-
tiful crops and such unrivaled pro-
sperity that shall silence all calum-
ny talkers and add to the strength
and enthusiasm of the republican
party.

We congratulate President Harri-
son upon his eminently wise, loyal
and courageous administration, and
declare our absolute confidence in
his integrity, ability and patrio-
tism, and pledge him our cordial
support in the discharge of the
duties devolving upon him as the
chief magistrate of the nation.

We rejoice in the restoration of

act of the present administration,

trous depression, and delay the re-
vival of business enterprise and
prosperity so ardently desired and
now so apparently near. The free
and unlimited coinage of silver
would tend to the hoarding of gold
and to force the use of cheap money
in the payment of wages in every
workshop, mill, factory, store and
farm, and tend to the scaling down
of the wages of the toilers and
weakening the purchasing power of
the dollar which would be used to
purchase the products of the farmer.
We are in favor of having every
dollar as good as any other dollar.

We demand the maintenance of
the American system of protection to
American industry and labor, the
policy that has been identified with
every period of our national pros-
perity.

We admire the genius of that
heroic statesman, William McKin-
ley, Jr., whom the people of Ohio
will make their next governor as a
recognition of his magnificent ser-
vices to the country. We also com-
mend and endorse that policy of re-
ciprocidity by which the Central and
South American nations and the
Spanish Indies are being opened up
to our trade upon favorable terms
and by which all the surplus
products of our country may find a
market and by which all our people
shall receive in exchange therefore
a long line of products which do
not produce ruinous competition

American agriculture are selling
higher today than for a long time
in that past, with the single excep-
tion of cotton, of which the cotton
planters themselves admit there

ing of sugar by putting it on the
free list proven that the tariff is a
tax.—Journal.

Such argument as the above can-
not fail to disgust the average
reader. Any intelligent man knows
there is as much difference between
a protective and a revenue tariff as
there is between black and white.
A tariff upon West India sugar,
Brazilian coffee or China tea is a
tax, pure and simple, and support-
ers of the protective tariff claim
nothing else. It is for that reason
that the republican party provided
in the McKinley bill for their free
admission into our ports.

A protective duty is levied pri-
marily for the purpose of creating
home production of the commodity,
thus rendering us not dependent
upon the foreign monopoly, and
history proves unmistakably that
it has that effect. A tariff levied
upon commodities we cannot pro-
duce but must import is a tax paid
by the consumer, and a revenue
duty. A tariff which renders us
capable of breaking the foreign
monopoly, and lowering the price
to the consumer, is not a tax.

The New York Sun (dem.) is not
inclined to drop into the free trade
channel into which its party is
drifting. As evidence of this we
submit the following questions
which that paper propounds to
Congressman Springer, of Illinois:

1. Why has the depression in
agriculture been so severe?
And why does it promise to be
lasting in Great Britain, a free trade
country?
2. Is it the Morrill tariff or the
McKinley tariff that is the cause of
the short crops in Europe this
year?
3. Why do trusts and monopolies
exist and flourish under the regime
of free trade as in Great Britain?
4. Why have the greatest fortunes
been made outside of the great pro-
tected industries?

The democratic sheet of life city
recognizing the ability of the re-
publican candidate for clerk of the
district court and chagrined by his
popularity as a candidate, seeks to
give vent to its sycophantic envy and
jealousy by yielding to the last re-
sort of the vanquished, viz., mud-
