Council Proceeding.
The city council met in regular session at the council chamber. All present except Browne. The minutes of the previous regular and special meetings were read and approved.

A petition, of Fred Herrman and others of First ward, was presented praying that Fifth street from the south side of Oak to Elm street and on the north to Locust street between Fourth and Sixth be placed in its condition.

On motion of Larson the prayer of the petition was granted, and the appropriation limited to \$50.

On motion of Murphy the street commissioner was instructed to do work previously ordered done on Fourth street. On motion of Minor the street commissioner was instructed to continue work with the road grader where needed.

A petition of Peter Bates and others was presented, praying that Silver street, lying between Second and Third streets, be graded and placed in good condition. On motion of Minor the matter was referred to the committee on streets alleys and bridges.

Minor moved that the report of the committee on streets, alleys and bridges, to the effect that a 60 foot road way be made through Ninth street to give access to parties in the Fifth ward, be adopted. Gutchie opposed the motion on the grounds that there was not a sufficient amount of money in the general fund from which to draw. He added further that if the making of appropriations was continued at the rate it had been that ere long the bonds of the city would not be worth seventy cents on the dollar.

Mr. Miner replied that it was, the citizens of the Fifth ward had only a fourteen-foot street, while every other ward was granted a sixty-foot outlet. The land could be purchased for \$1,000 and in justice to the taxpayers of the Fifth ward he maintained that it should be granted. Salisbury raised the point, and he was sustained by the city attorney, that the city had no authority to buy land as per the report of the committee. On motion of Miser the city clerk was instructed to advertise for damages in view of the condemnation of land as per the committee's report.

On motion of Salisbury an alley was ordered made giving Mr. O. Donohue access to the city.
A petition was presented by J. C. Peterson and others that Vine street between Maiden Lane and the first street east of Omaha and Southern R. R. on same and also Maiden Lane between Oak and Main streets be put in good condition for travel.

On motion of Salisbury the prayer of the petition was granted.

On motion of Larson the sidewalk committee was instructed to order property owners to build sidewalk on Vine street between Sixth and Seventh.

On motion the council adjourned.
