A Correspondent to the Kearney Hub
Tells of the Nebraska Wonder.
MASSILLON, October 28, 1891

DEAR SIR:—We are spending Sun-
day here. Just one week out from
Chicago. This is no snap for me I
tell you, work from 6 a. m. till 9 p.
m. We show in about three towns
each day to large and appreciative
crowds of people, many farmers
coming in twelve miles bringing
their families to see "Nebraska."
They declare it superlative. They
say California, Georgia and
Florida which have been over this
route last year "weren't in it" com-
pared with Nebraska on wheels. I

church having prepared liberally for
the occasion by banking the altar
with palms and chrysanthemums,
hiding the choir rail and part of
the organ with the veil of green.

the organ and during the gather-
ing of the guests soft and inspiring
music filled the church. At 6:20,
the time for the ceremony, the wed-
ding march from Lohengrin was
taken up, the doors of the vestibule
opened and the bridal party ap-
peared.
