The Representatives of Nebraska, The Garden City of the West

Close Their Exhibit Here With a Banquet to the Members of the Press. Columbus Will Next be Visited.

The enterprising delegation from fertile Nebraska have closed their beautiful and creditable exhibit here and have left for a three days' exhibit at Columbus and Newark. The enterprise of Nebraska's citizens in thus sending such an efficient delegation with so substantial and pleasing an exhibit as evidence of the growth, fertility, prospects and advantages of the state is truly worthy of commendation. And from the samples of rich stores, the evidence of a grand climate and fertile soil, we are indeed led to believe that Nebraska must be a state of great possibilities. The members of the delegation are men especially fitted for their novel work of showing to all doubters the possibilities of Nebraska as an agricultural and horticultural state.

Last evening the members of the association entertained the members of the press of this city, by a banquet served at the Russell House, and served in the efficient and sumptuous manner, characteristic to the Russell House management. After the bounteous spread, words of welcome and commendation were spoken to the representatives of the great state by the editor of the Review and the editor of the Leader. Fittingly and eloquently were their words responded to by Rev. O. R. Beebe, of Broken Bow, who, on behalf of the delegation extended thanks to Alliance for her reception of their exhibit, saying, that although they had everywhere been welcomed most kindly and hospitably, they had received in no place a more cordial and hearty welcome than had been given them by the people of Alliance. They left last night for Newark and Columbus, where they will be heartily welcomed, the former city having been decorated in honor of Nebraska's exhibition.

THE VERY LATEST

Ohio and Nebraska Republican, With Iowa Divided.

Flower Carries New York by 40,000-- Massachusetts Republicans Elect Everything Except Governor--Results in Other States.

The latest returns from Ohio indicate that McKinley's plurality will be 23,000, and the republican majority in the legislature will be thirty-eight on joint ballot, which insures the election of a republican senator to succeed Senator Sherman. Republicans have every reason to feel proud of the result in Ohio, inasmuch as it is the only state in which national issues were made paramount to all others. The campaign, from start to finish, has been one of education, and after the people have undergone a thorough schooling, at the hands of the greatest masters of these questions in America, they have spoken in no unmistakable language. The result is a complete triumph for the republican policy of protection, reciprocity and honest money.

There is little question that Post's majority in Nebraska will reach 8,000. The returns are not complete, but the strong gains made by Post in supposed Edgerton strongholds insures a complete triumph for the entire republican ticket. While the result is not purely a partisan victory, inasmuch as the full democratic vote was not given to Edgerton, there is little question that the sub-treasury loans, the question of issuing unlimited paper currency and the policy of free and unlimited coinage of silver has each received a black eye. The people of Nebraska are to be congratulated that they have so ably done their duty and maintained the credit of our state and the dignity of our supreme court.

In Iowa the result is highly encouraging to the republicans. Both parties are still claiming the governorship but conservative estimates indicate that the entire democratic state ticket is elected. The republicans find encouragement in the fact that gains have been made in the legislature, insuring the election of a republican senator to succeed Senator Wilson. The fight on the governorship was made solely on the prohibition question and the election of Boies has no significance concerning national issues. In the election of the legislature, however, the policy of the party on national issues was at stake and the result is a complete party victory.

The vote polled in New York was exceptionally light, indicating little interest in the result. Flower's plurality will reach 40,000. The fight was purely local, Fasset turning his batteries upon Tammany hall and Flower pushing the world's fair issue with effect. Hereafter, doubtless, Fasset will be inclined to favor New York for the world's fair. The result will have a tendency to put the republicans in fighting condition for 1892, when the fight will be made on the tariff and free coinage questions. The western portions of the state had little interest in Tammany, but upon the issues of tariff, reciprocity and honest money a much better republican vote could have been polled.

Pennsylvania rolls up her old time republican majority of 50,000. The fight in this state, however, was mainly local, and has but little national significance.

The democrats elect a governor in Massachusetts by 5,000 plurality. Governor Russell thinks the result indicates that the people desire the free entry into our ports of raw material. The McKinley bill as a whole has not entered into the canvass. The republicans elect a good working majority in the legislature and the balance of the entire state ticket.

The returns are in from every precinct in the county except Greenwood, which is reported to have gone republican, though thus far it has been impossible to get anything positive. The result, not considering Greenwood precinct, as follows:

Supreme judge, A. M. Post (rep.) over Jos. Edgerton (ind.), 845; district judge, S. M. Chapman (rep.) over H. D. Travis (dem.), 594; county judge, B. S. Ramsey (dem.) over Calvin Kussell (rep.), 638; county treasurer, L. C. Eickhof (rep.) over Fred Herrmann (dem.), 356; county clerk, Frank Dickson (rep.) over J. B. Tipton (dem.), 528; sheriff, Geo. Edson (rep.) over Wm. Tighe (dem.), 10; district clerk, W. H. Deering (dem.) over A. Salisbury (rep.), 36; county superintendent, G. W. Noble (dem.) over J. E. Leyda (rep.), 23; coroner, J. L. Unruh (rep.) over Dr. Brendel (dem.), 312; surveyor, A. C. Hayes (rep.) over Fred Patterson (dem.), 263.

It is probable that Greenwood precinct will enable Salisbury to overcome Deering's majority of 36; aside from that the result will stand as above indicated.
