Large Apple Shipments

It is everywhere conceded that Cass is the greatest apple producing county in Nebraska, but yet the majority of our people have but a faint idea of the enormity of this production. We have obtained a statement from our local apple dealers, which shows to what extent other portions of the state have been supplied from our surplus product, thus rendering the reader able to tell approximately as to the productiveness of our soil along that line.

Mr. Ed Somers has shipped from this place since Sept. 1, twenty-five cars, each containing 100 barrels, making in all 4,000 barrels. He yet has in his storehouse ready for the market 300 barrels, which will be disposed of soon. He has shipped 500 from Nebraska and 600 barrels from Union. He has paid in cash to the farmers of Cass county over \$7,000.

Wiley Black has shipped about 3,000 barrels, and after he has disposed of the amount yet on hand, together with what he has contracted yet to be delivered, he thinks he will have handled 5,000 barrels. It will be perfectly safe to estimate that the apple industry has brought \$15,000 into the pockets of Cass county farmers this year.
