A MYSTERIOUS DISAPPEARANCE

The Whereabouts of Rasmus Petersen Unknown—Four Play Suspected

Our usually quiet little city has been stirred up somewhat by the sudden disappearance of Rasmus Petersen. Mr. Petersen went to Omaha on the 7:15 train Monday morning, expecting to return on the late train in the evening, but as yet he has not returned and no knowledge can be obtained as to his whereabouts. He took dinner at a relative's in Omaha Monday and transacted business at the wholesale house of Paxton & Gallagher at 2 p.m. He left this place for the store of W. A. Murer, of Council Bluffs, where he expected to purchase a stock of Christmas goods, intending to return to Paxton & Gallagher's before taking the 6:45 train for Plattsmouth.

A telephone message from W. A. Murer at 10 a. m. to-day said that he had seen nothing of him, and Paxton & Gallagher testify that he failed to return to their place of business as he anticipated, neither was he at the station to take the 6:40 train.

There is considerable speculation as to the cause of his disappearance. He has been subject to heart disease for some time, which, together with the fact that he has been feeling unwell for several days, is suggested as a probable index to the matter. The prevailing opinion, however, is that he has been foully dealt with. In going to Council Bluffs he probably passed under the viaduct on Tenth street, from Marcy to Harney streets, where foul play would be easily accomplished and detection rendered extremely doubtful. He is known to have had in his possession in the neighborhood of \$200 in money.

To whatever cause his disappearance may be attributed, all concede that he is surely unable to communicate, or he would notify his family and alleviate their anxiety. Mr. Petersen is not a man that would mingle in questionable society and if he is not confined on account of sickness there is little doubt that he has been forcibly detained. His friends here, and Mrs. Petersen especially, are very much concerned and very anxious that the truth be known. Messrs. J. C. and Chris Petersen took the early train for Omaha this morning and no pains will be spared to ascertain as to his whereabouts.

A FORMER PLATTSMOUTH MAN.

Killed at Fairmont in a Wreck on the B. & M. Road.

A disastrous wreck is reported to have occurred at Fairmont at 7:30 a. m. yesterday. It appears that the B. & M. flyer had just pulled out and the Fairmont & Chester accommodation had side tracked and was loading freight preparatory to leaving. The switch had been left open through the negligence of brakeman Hulben and a through freight dashed into the rear of the Chester freight. Brakeman Hulben, the man responsible for the accident, was instantly killed. F. M. Barnhouse, conductor was horribly mangled and died an hour later.

Mr. Barnhouse will be remembered as a former resident of Plattsmouth, he having been employed as baggage master of the B. & M., making his home here.

AT THE COURT HOUSE.

A painter from Omaha, who recently began work on the court house was seriously and perhaps fatally injured at 5 p. m. yesterday. He attempted to assist in the unloading of a box of plate glass, weighing 100 pounds, and by becoming over balanced the box fell across his hip crushing it and probably injuring him internally. At this writing he appears to be resting better but there is no certainty that he will recover.

The county court docket has been unavoidably crowded out of today's issue, but it will appear tomorrow.

Board adjourned till to-morrow.

Board met, full board present, when the following was done to-wit:

Appointment of D. Woodard, constable for Weeping Water city was made upon petition, and bond approved.

Board ordered that the county clerk draw warrants to judges and clerks of election for amount equal to twenty-five cents per hour for time consumed while sitting on election boards, and allowing three judges for each precinct and voting district and five judge for each ward in Plattsmouth city where registration is required.

Bill of Dr. J. H. Hall for medical service on Fred Molin was reconsidered and refused payment.

Upon petition a Druggist's permit was granted to L. E. Myers of Cedar Creek for one year.
