All Efforts to Find Him Have Thus Far Proved Fruitless.

It has been intimated that domestic troubles may have driven him to leave, but this is largely speculation and a few subsequent facts develop we should not be warranted in drawing that conclusion.

Before leaving Omaha last evening the Petersen brothers left a photograph and full description with the chief of police and in the event that he has been finally dealt with—which is a probable—the fact will soon be known.

We are requested by the Petersen brothers to state that the grocery business is being conducted by R. Petersen with continue at the same stand, and customers will receive the same prompt and cordial treatment that has been accorded them heretofore.
