The Petersen Case.

The mysterious disappearance of
R. Petersen has not yet become
thoroughly clear, yet it is evident
that he is alive, but in all probability
suffering the pang of a guilty
conscience. There is now little
doubt that he left Omaha Monday
via the U. P. for the south as
per the statement of Fireman
Fitch previously published. There
is incontrovertible evidence that
he obtained several hundred dol-
lars under false pretenses, and it
has been stated upon pretty good
authority that he forged a note to
the amount of \$600 just prior to
his leaving. It is pretty
conclusive that he had at the
time of leaving an amount of money
in the neighborhood of \$200, that
was really the property of other
parties.

What seems mysterious is that
his creditors were not crowding
him and his assets will by far more
than equal his liabilities. It is
stated, upon good authority also,
that he made a deposit of \$600 just
a few days since, which cannot but
serve to create a little doubt that
he left voluntarily. The oldest ac-
quaintances of Mr. Petersen express
profound surprise at his action, as
his character in the past has been
above reproach and his business
transactions perfectly straight.

In view of all development thus
far it is thought that his leave is
either due to mental derangement
or because of some private trouble,
at this writing unknown.
