Mrs. Chapman took care of the party in a particularly happy manner, serving an eleven o'clock dinner which was relished and praised by the "delegates" and their friends as only such a feast deserves to be praised. The meeting, we learn, was entirely informal, but resulted to the entire satisfaction of those participating.

A Narrow Escape.

An interesting incident is narrated in this morning's State Journal in which a tramp prevented a railroad disaster on the B. & M. road near Crawford:

"An engine attached to Manager Holdrege's private car was speeding along at the rate of forty miles an hour and was approaching a bridge which had been partially burned and was in a dangerous condition. A tramp, who had just passed over it, signalled the engineer and the train was brought to a standstill in the nick of time. The bridge spans a deep canon and is over 100 feet in length. The tramp was given a purse and provided with a pass to St. Joseph. He was a passenger on the train which was wrecked near here yesterday."

Petersen Affair.

There have been no new developments as to the whereabouts of R. Petersen. There appears to be little doubt that he left voluntarily, and with the intention never to return. His accessible property is valued as follows: Residence, \$2,000; stock of goods, \$2,000; dwelling house, \$300; vacant lot, \$100; farm, \$4,000; making in the aggregate a total of \$8,900.

At this writing the following attachments have been filed: Jas. H. Snell, \$104.12; Fred Gorder & Son, \$25; C. H. Petersen, \$2,000; Dudley, Steele & Co., \$124.62; McCord, Brady & Co., \$286.82; Paxton & Gallagher, \$173.08; Gronceng & Schalingen, \$82.90; Tychsen & Reusch, \$61.51; Ashland Mill & Electric Light Co., \$120.15; Jas. Japsen, 150; Rasmus Hansen, \$100; Gertrude S. Petersen, Allen Bros., \$113.05; mortgage on house, \$800; Fred Straeder, \$27; Julius Pepperberg, \$7.50; John E. Bates, \$98.87; L. G. Larson, \$336.40; making in the aggregate \$4,397.87, thus making it appear that after all creditors have been paid in full there will be about \$4,000 worth of property free from incumbrance.

It has been estimated that Mr. Petersen had in his possession at the time of leaving about \$2,000, which still leaves a balance of \$3,000 accessible by him or his relatives. It is probable however that there are yet other creditors who will file other attachments in the near future, though at this writing this is merely a matter of conjecture.
