We would also request of you to publish, in addition to the call, that it is desirable that the appointments of delegates would make the appointments as early as possible and forward a list of the names to C. A. Atkinson, secretary board of trade, Lincoln, in order that our arrangements here may conform to the number of delegates in attendance.

The indications point to a large and enthusiastic meeting, and we trust it will prove a benefit to all parts of our state. Whatever you may choose to say editorially in this connection will be duly appreciated by us and stimulate, we trust, the interest on this important subject among the people of your county.
