DISTURBANCE AT THE YARDS.

An Engine Jumps the Track and Derails Several Cars.

As freight train No. 19 attempted to cross the first frog this side of the bridge at 12 m. to-day an unfortunate and what might have been a disastrous wreck occurred. The train was a doubleheader. The first engine crossed the frog in safety but the second started up the adjacent track. As they were making a speed of barely eight miles per hour and the friction was great owing to the antagonism of the two engines, they advanced but about eight rods before a stop was made. The disturbance resulted in the derailing of one engine, three cars, and a few trifling injuries to the engines and car appliances.
