Police Court

An interesting case—Wagner vs. Hawks—was tried in court this morning, in which the former sued the latter for \$57. The plaintiff alleges that he loaned Mrs. Greeson, whom Hawks subsequently married, a sum of money, and he now attempts to collect the amount from Hawks. He alleges, and attempts to prove, that the defendant authorized the woman to borrow the money on his account, which Hawks denies. In his testimony the plaintiff claimed having loaned the woman \$177.50; then again he stated that it was \$120, and finally he swears for \$57. Mrs. Greeson is well known in this city, having formerly resided here. She married Hawks some time since, but subsequently left him and commenced suit for a divorce; but the suit was finally withdrawn and they are now living together again. In the trial in question it was evident that her sympathies were for the plaintiff. John Seiberts, a mention of whose arrest was made in yesterday's HERALD on a charge of assault, came into court this morning and withdrew the plea that he acted in self defense, plead guilty to the charge and received the usual \$5 and cost sentence, upon the payment of which he was discharged from custody.

G. F. Allen was brought into court this morning charged with drunkenness. He plead guilty, deposited \$5 and costs in the city treasury and went on his way rejoicing.
