A SAD DEATH.

John Monroe Instantly Killed While Making a Coupling at the B. & M. Yards.

Our citizens were horrified last evening by the announcement that John Monroe, a switchman at the B. & M. yards, had been instantly killed. The corpse was at once taken in charge by Coroner Unruh and conveyed to apartments over his place of business. As it lay upon a stretcher it indeed presented anything but a pleasing scene. The head was crushed into an unrecognizable mass. The skull was crushed as if it were a piece of chinaware, while the brain, the little that remained, was dangling from the skull. The face was badly bruised and covered with blood rendering the scene sickening in the extreme. Evidences that the car-wheel had passed partly over the abdomen were discernable. As soon as practicable, Coroner Unruh cared for the corpse and rendered it in as presentable condition as possible.

The accident happened a few minutes before 7 last evening. The unfortunate man was attempting to couple a flat to a box car. The flat car was loaded with heavy timbers, which projected over the end of the car and the presumption at first was, though that view has been disproved by the coroner's jury, that as he stepped between the cars his head was caught by one of the timbers and jammed against the car with great force. Brakeman Wilson stated that he stood within eight or nine feet of the man at the time of the accident and he saw the timber jam his head against the car and as the train slacked he immediately dropped to the ground. Others testified before the coroner's jury that the injury was more probably caused by the car wheel.

The coroner empaneled the following jury: Wm. Weber, W. W. Hull, Ed Fitzgerald, A. D. Despain, C. B. Nobles, O. C. Dovey. About a dozen witnesses were examined and the following verdict was rendered:

At an inquisition holden at Plattsmouth, in Cass county, on the 15th day of December, A. D. 1891, before me, J. I. Unruh, coroner of said county, upon the body of John Monroe, lying dead, by the jurors whose names are hereunto subscribed, the said jurors upon their oath say, That the said John Monroe came to his death while attempting to make a coupling in the Plattsmouth yard of the B. & M. R. Co. from accidentally falling under the car wheel and the wheel of the car running onto him; and that, in our opinion, from the evidence and to the best of our belief, no blame could be attached to the company or its employees.

The deceased is a young man, unmarried, and has been living with his parents in Plattsmouth the greater portion of the past five years. Until recently he has been employed upon the street works of the city. About four months since, he went to Lincoln, where he commenced switching, but as there was an opening for him in that work here, he began work in the Plattsmouth yards Oct. 13. He has always been considered a quiet, honest, upright young man, and his untimely end will be deplored by his large circle of friends. The shock is especially hard for his aged mother, at this time lying at the point of death.

The funeral will take place at the residence of Mr. Monroe's parent in Shafferville, at 11 a. m. to-morrow.

A crowd of young people, representatives of the Epworth League, met at the residence of Mrs. Kennedy last evening, and completed two comforters, to be donated to a family who are in destitute circumstances. We are glad to note this evidence of generosity and charity on the part of this organization of young people, and it is certainly to be commended. And as winter approaches and the poor of our city become more in need of material comforts, the members of the League will doubtless be glad to co-operate with any in alleviating distress.

Council Proceedings.

Council met last evening in regular session.

On motion of Larson, W. L. Browne was chosen temporary president.

Minutes of previous meeting read and approved.

A communication from J. C. Petersen was presented, asking to be relieved from liability as bondsman for H. M. Bonn's saloon license. On motion of Larson the matter was referred to the license committee, with instructions to require Mr. Bonn to furnish additional bond in the event that the council should release Mr. Petersen.

Reports of police judge and marshal were read and referred to police committee.

Treasurer's report was read and referred to finance committee.

Mr. Gutsche moved that the report be adapted and warrants drawn upon the treasurer for the payment of same; also, that salary of councilmen to date be included. Carried.

Bill of H. J. Straight for money expended for signal flags was referred to the claims committee.

The claims committee made the following report on claim of Dan Coffey of \$15 referred at the previous meeting: Recommended that Mr. Coffey be allowed \$6, and that the treasurer be instructed to turn over \$5 of balance of claim to the school fund. On motion of Gutsche the report was adopted.

On motion of Jones of the Second ward the committee on streets alleys and bridges was instructed to request the M. P. R. R. to lay a crossing under the viaduct.

On motion of Miner the marshal was instructed to serve notices on all parties authorized by previous resolutions to build sidewalks, to comply with instructions, and that he make a report to city clerk.

Mr. Larson moved that the services of J. Denson be dispensed with. On motion of Gutsche the matter was postponed until the next meeting.

Mr. Gutsche offered the following resolution:

"Resolved, by the mayor and council of the city of Plattsmouth, that the treasurer be and is hereby instructed to transfer the sum of \$2,000 from the business tax to the general fund."

On motion of Larson the resolution was adopted.
