A SAD DEATH.

John Monroe Instantly Killed While lar session. Making a Coupling at the B. & M. Yards.

evening by the announcement that Honor the Mayor, Clerk Fox and John Monroe, a switchman at the Murphy. B. & M. yards, had been instantly killed. The corpse was at once taken in charge by Coroner Unruh president. and conveyed to spartments over his place of business. As it lay upon a stretcher it indeed presented anything but a pleasing scene. The head was crushed into an unrecognizable mass. The skull was crushed as it it were a piece of chinaware, while the brain, the little that remained, was daugling from the skull. The face was badly bruised and covered with blood rendering the scene sickening in the extreme. Evidences that the car-wheel had passed partly over the abdomen were discernable.
