### THE BEET SUGAR CONVENTION.

A Large Attendance and an Enthusiastic Meeting.  
In response to the call for a beet sugar convention by the Lincoln board of trade, about 400 representative Nebraskans assembled in the representative hall of the state capitol yesterday. Hon. R. H. Oakley, president of the Lincoln board of trade, called the meeting to order at 2:45 p. m. Gov. Thayer was called upon and responded in one of the best speeches of his life. The governor expressed a deep interest in any move having for its object the betterment of the state and encouraged the beet sugar industry.

Pending the appointment of committees, Col. Sam Cox of Lincoln made a stirring address favoring the industry.  
The temporary organization was made permanent by the election of ex-Lieutenant Governor Meiklejohn as president and Messrs. Nason and Atkinson secretaries.

The following committees were appointed:  
The committee on credentials is composed of D. H. Wheeler, Douglas, R. H. Oakley of Lancaster, S. C. Smith of Gage, J. J. Lease of Chadron, S. P. Mable of Hall, L. V. Haiskell of Polk, G. M. Lee of Furnas, Robert Furnas of Nemaha, Brad Slaughter of Nance.

Resolutions—Ex Governor Furnas, Thummell of Hall, Judge C. R. Scott of Douglas, J. H. McClay of Lancaster, J. S. Hoagland of Lincoln, C. H. Deitrich of Adams, C. W. Beck of Red Willow.  
Permanent Organization—C. A. Atkinson of Lincoln, C. E. Adams of Superior, Smith of Beatrice, W. H. Tanningoff Crawford, James Whitehead of Broken Bow.

The papers were well prepared, many, however, drawing out spirited discussions with a wide diversity of opinion relative to the growing of beets. The convention cannot fail to have the desired effect in stimulating investigation in this growing industry and enlightening the people regarding it.

Mr. Sherman, says the Governor made a good presiding officer and reflected great credit upon the state.

### Plattsmouth May Have a Chance

A HERALD reporter met Pres Croan of Shenandoah on No. 5 this morning, enroute for Lincoln. During the brief stop we conversed with him relative to his intentions for the future. He informed us that he proposed to establish a normal school in a live progressive Nebraska town. At present he has had several propositions which he is considering. Upon inquiry as to whether it would be practicable for Plattsmouth to make a bid to secure its location, he informed us that he would be very glad to have Plattsmouth enter the race. He expressed himself as favorably impressed with our little city and had little doubt that a normal school could be made a grand success at this place.

In the event our citizen desire to avail themselves of a golden opportunity to make a progressive move, it will be well to consider the matter proposed by Mr. Croan. There is not the least doubt that a normal college, such as he would establish would be an honor to our city and a credit to our state.

The benefits accruing in a financial source cannot well be overestimated. The school recently destroyed at Shenandoah has had an average attendance the entire year of nearly eight hundred students and assisted by the more liberal support of larger and wealthier town, the progressive and energetic qualities of Pres Croan could not fail to largely increase the attendance. These students would spend thousands of dollars annually with the merchants of our town.  
We suggest that our board of trade consider the matter at once.
