CONGRESSMEN-AT-LARGE.

The states that gain representatives in congress under the new apportionment will do well to elect them at large, instead of hastening to make special districts for them. Better men are likely to be chosen where there is a whole state to select from, as experience has shown in repeated instances; and they have peculiar chances of usefulness by reason of their large constituencies. It would not be a bad plan, in fact, to have a portion. of the congressmen of each state less time than any other treatment. elected in that way at all times. As the matter is now arranged. there is more or less conflict between the different members from the same state on account of strictly local interests. Nobody is authorized to speak for the state as a whole in the house, but several individuals speak for separate factions of it, and do not often bed beyond the limits of light respective districts. When Gen. It is not to be doubted a fact which proves to what an extent that such an arrangement would tend to raise the standard of congressional qualification, as well as to promote legislation of a wise and worthy sort.
