

IN THEIR NEW HOME.

The New Council Chamber Nicely Fitted-Up.

IMPORTANT SESSION LAST NIGHT.

The Council Held Their First Session in the New Chamber Last Night--The Sullivan and Dundas Judgments Order d Paid--\$500 Appropriated For Advertising

The council's new quarters in the Wetenkamp block are fitted up and make a fine place for the city dads to hold their meetings. Each councilman is furnished with a desk nicely arranged, while the newspaper folks are fitted out with a large table. The desks are arranged in a triangle and the floors are carpeted. The old council chamber can't hold a candle to the new one.

The council was called to order by President Murphy and the following responded to roll call: W. D. Jones, Murphy, Steinkler, Lake, Minor and Graves. The mayor and Councilmen Spies, Petersen and D. M. Jones came in later.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. A resolution by Spies was read, calling for the paving of Sixth street between Vine and Pearl. On motion the resolution was adopted. A committee was instructed to ascertain whether the property owners wished the street paved with brick or macadamized, and the city attorney was instructed to draw up an ordinance to that effect.

Mrs. Burton asked the council to take some action to keep the water from overflowing her property on Holdrege street. The petition was referred to the committee on streets, alleys and bridges.

Mrs. M. Carroll also stated in a petition to the council that they would have to take some action to keep water from overflowing her property, as it was impossible for her to raise any garden, and that the clay had covered her ground so that it was unfit for cultivation. Referred to streets, alleys and bridges committee.

A resolution was read ordering sidewalk laid in different parts of the city, and, if not done within ten days after receiving notice, the city would build it and charge the cost up as taxes against the city. The resolution was adopted, with the exception of that part pertaining to North Sixth street, which was referred to the streets, alleys and bridges committee.

Mr. Murphy then stated that Mr. Windham was present and that he had a statement to make. Mr. Windham then addressed the council on the subject of advertising the city. He stated that as a member of the joint committee appointed by the board of trade and the council for the purpose of devising ways and means of advancing the interests of the city, that the committee had been looking around and that he had in his possession the names of over 200 manufacturing establishments of every description in the east whose capital was lying idle and who were looking around for places to locate. He said the committee thought it best to have a large number of pamphlets printed, with cuts of the principal business houses and residences, and a description of the many advantages the city offered to manufacturing establishments, and he asked the council to make an appropriation to pay for said advertising.

On motion of Mr. Petersen the council appropriated \$500, or as much as would be necessary to judiciously advertise the city's many advantages. The motion passed without a dissenting voice. The police judge's report for the month of May showed that \$15 had been collected in fines.

The city treasurer's report was read and referred to the finance committee. The opening of South Ninth street was brought up and the city attorney instructed to get options on all property along the proposed line. On motion, the Sullivan judgment was ordered paid, amounting to some \$600, for services rendered during the county seat trouble.

The fire warden reported that he had condemned the buildings on lots 16 and 17, Stiles' addition, and the city clerk was instructed to notify property owners. The following accounts against the city were allowed and warrants ordered drawn:

The official bond of John Fitzpatrick was read and approved. The mayor then nominated James Grace for chief of police. The roll was called and resulted as follows: Aye--W. D. Jones, D. M. Jones, Spies, Murphy, Petersen and Minor--6. Nay--Longenhagen, Steinkler, Lake and Graves--4. The vote confirmed and he is wearing the star of authority to-day.

On motion the council adjourned to meet next Monday night.

Commissioners' Proceedings. PLATTSMOUTH, Neb., June 7--The board met pursuant to adjournment and full board present. Minutes of the May session read and approved and the following business was transacted in the regular form:

Report of the state auditor in regard to bonds from \$1 to \$100 of Cass county to the B. & M. Ry Co., being due was received and filed.

R. J. Hempel, for janitor is to receive \$30 per month commencing with April 22, 1892 until such time as change may be made by commissioners.

Petition of John Lutz for reduction of assessment on lots 2 and 3 in block 2, Stoddeman's add to Platts-mouth for the year 1891 was reduced from \$500 to \$250, the same being considered a double assessment.

On petition John Eidman was appointed constable in and for Stove Creek precinct.

Contract was made with the Nebraska Telephone Company for four telephones for the court house at \$3.80 per month for each telephone.

The commissioners having reconsidered the claims for damages on what is called the Nehawka road have allowed the following sums in full payment and the sums have been accepted as follows:

Petition for county bridge on 6th and 7th streets in the village of Rock Bluffs was refused. Official bond of W. J. Laughlin, assessor of Salt Creek precinct, appointed May 20, 1892, approved.

Notice of William Weber in regard to being engaged in the manufacture, bottling and selling soda and mineral waters in Plattsmouth, and warning all parties against appropriating or destroying marks, bottles, brands, etc., was filed and accepted.

S. Hulfish was granted a druggist's permit for one year in the village of Wabash, from date, having complied with all the requirements of law. Official bond of John Eidman approved.

Board adjourned to meet at board of equalization June 14.

FRANK DICKSON, County Clerk. Supreme Court Decisions. Everett vs. Tidball & Fuller, error from Cass county, affirmed. Opinion by Chief Justice Maxwell.

Under section 372 of the code the deposition of a witness may be used only in the following cases: 1. When the witness does not reside in the county where the action or proceeding is pending, or is sent for trial by a change of venue or is absent therefrom.

2. When, from age, infirmity or imprisonment, the witness is unable to attend the court, or is dead. 3. When the testimony is required upon a motion, or in any other case where the oral examination of a witness is not required.

4. When a deposition is offered to be read in evidence, it must appear to the satisfaction of the court, that for any cause specified in section 372, the attendance of the witness cannot be procured. If the witness is openly within the county at the time of the trial and is not prevented by age, infirmity or imprisonment from appearing in court, his deposition cannot be substituted for his personal presence to give testimony if the adverse party objects to such deposition.

5. Where no objection is made in the motion for a new trial and the verdict is excessive, the objection cannot be considered for the first time in the supreme court.

6. A draft payable to the order of the payee and endorsed in blank by him and delivered to a third party is thereafter like a negotiable instrument payable to bearer, and the title will pass by mere delivery.

Loder vs. Loder, appeal from Cass county, affirmed. Opinion by Chief Justice Maxwell. In an action to set aside a deed made by a father in his dotage to his youngest son, held, that the testimony tended to show undue influence on the part of the son and that the father was not in a mental condition to transact important business.

2. The judgment is supported by the weight of evidence and is affirmed. Fred Erickson and Amonia Stockwell were granted a license and Judge Ramsey then and there married them. They had in their possession the written consent of the girls' parents. They were both sworn and said that the bride was of age. This afternoon the mother of the girl made her appearance and said that the girl was only sixteen years old. She nor her husband had never given their consent to the match and also that the written consent was written by somebody besides herself or her husband. After she thought over the matter and the penalty the couple would suffer she concluded to let the matter drop.
