NOTED DALTON GANG

They Rob the Pacific Express Company and Escape.

THREE DETECTIVES WOUNDED.

The Missouri, Kansas & Texas Passenger Train Held up by Masked Men and Robbrd of \$40,000 Last Night.

GUTHRIE, OKL., July 15 .- The Missouri, Kansas & Texas passenger train No. 2, south bound, was held up by a gang of masked robbers at Adair, I. T., late last night. The robbers secured the contents of the safe of the Pacific Express company and made good their escape. It is believed that the robbers were the noted Dalton gang, who are responsible for a large number of similar crimes in the territory, the latest being the robbery of the Santa Fe express near Red Rock, hardly a month ago.

Four of the gang were recently captured near Guthrie, and a posse was on the track of the others of the gang. The capture of the four took place in the early part of this week and it was believed that the remaining members would certainly be captured. They evidently eluded their pursuers, and while yet fresh from the pursuit committed another daring robbery.

It is believed that the four men captured "peached" on the gang and revealed the plot of last night's robbery, for a posse was organized at Adair to protect the Missouri, Kansas & Texas ain. The method of the robbery corresponds with the methods of all the Dalton operations. The train had just left Adair when two men crawled over the tender, terro: ed the engineer and his fireman with drawn revolvers, and commanded the engineer to stop the train. As he did so the posse prepared for an attack, which was immediately made by the members of the gang from the roadside.

J. G. Kennedy and two Indian policemen, members of the posse, were shot and slightly wounded. They, together with the other members of the posse, retreated, and left the robbers a clear field. The express messenger, in the mean time, had locked his sale and hidden the key, after 'aving barricaded the doors of the car. The robbers broke through the barricade, drilled the safes and blew them open with powder, securing their entire contents. The amount stolen is believed to be in the neighborhood of \$40,000. The robbers escaped.

The News at Headquarters. PARSONS, KAN., July 15 .- The following particulars of the robbery have been received here by the officers of the road: "The gang went to Adair about 9 o'clock, held up the station agent at the point of Winchesters, cleaned the station out of all valuables and then sat calmly down and waited for the arrival of the train due at 9:45. Just as the train was pulling out of Adair, two of the gang climbed over the tender and covered the engineer and fireman with revolvers and compelled them to stop the train. As the train slowed up, the guard, consisting of Captain J. J. Kinney, chief of detectives of the road, and two Indian policemen, prepared to make a fight. The members of the gang gathered from the roadside, however, and a lively fusilade followed, in which Kinney and the two Indians were wounded and compelled to retreat, having emptied their revolvers. During the fight two stray bullets struck a drug store up town, seriously injuring Drs. Youngblood and Goug. The latter has since died, and the former is in a critical condition.

A New Church Edifice at South Bend William Kirk of South Bend was in the city to day soliciting aid by subscription to build a church at that place. The foundation is already laid and was donated by South Bend parties. The other material and work will cost about. \$500. Mr. Kirk said he had nearly enough money subscribed to finish and that the lumber would be ordered Monday and the work pushed to completion. The church will be of the Christian denomination.

In Justice Court. An interesting case occupied the attention of Judge Smith's court Saturday, wherein J. T. Richey was plaintiff and Peter Eveland and William Pool, Sr., were defendants. Evidence showed that Mr. Richey, who was a member of the building committee, had donated \$15 to help build the M. E. church at Wabash; also volunteered to solicit subscriptions for the building and did other odd jobs for the welfare of the Christian cause. When the time of building came the edifice was not constructed to suit Mr. Richey's taste and he registered a kick and said he would give \$100 if it was within nine days of the time when the case would be outlowed, Mr. Richey sues the men above named, who were only a part of the committee, to recover his \$15 with interest, and \$75 for labor and time. Attorney Wooley appeared for plaintiff and ex-County Attorney ·Beeson for defendants. Judge Smith rendered a decision in favor as no cause for action. Costs, \$20.15.
