They Rob the Pacific Express Company and Escape.

THREE DETECTIVES WOUNDED.

The Missouri, Kansas & Texas Passenger Train Held up by Masked Men and Robbed of \$40,000 Last Night.

GUTHRIE, OKL., July 15.—The Missouri, Kansas & Texas passenger train No. 2, south bound, was held up by a gang of masked robbers at Adair, I. T., late last night.

Four of the gang were recently captured near Guthrie, and a posse was on the track of the others of the gang.

It is believed that the four men captured "peached" on the gang and revealed the plot of last night's robbery, for a posse was organized at Adair to protect the Missouri, Kansas & Texas train.

J. G. Kennedy and two Indian policemen, members of the posse, were shot and slightly wounded. They, together with the other members of the posse, retreated, and left the robbers a clear field.
