Judge Field's Able Arguments Last Night.

ENTHUSIASTIC MEETING.

Able, Logical and Unanswerable Arguments Presented by Judge Field on the Democratic Ticket.

Old Fashioned Times

The large crowd of voters that have assembled at any one time to listen to any one man, was the large and enthusiastic crowd that greeted the next congressman from the first district—Judge Allen W. Field—last night at Rockwood hall.

The meeting was called to order by Judge A. N. Sullivan, who without further delay, introduced the speaker. When Judge Field ascended the platform the tumultuous applause continued for several minutes, as soon as quiet was regained Judge Field said that there were several local matters that he wished to speak of before entering upon the discussion of the evening.

He then referred to the Dogge matter and said that when the republican party became so weak that it had to use the Dogge family to bolster up its losing cause he was through with it.

He then brought out the Black-mailer Petersen and stated his case. He said he was sorry for the man, or for any other man that was in the condition of Petersen; that he had never seen Petersen when he was sober; that the first time he ever seen him was one Sunday Petersen came to his house in Lincoln and that he was in a horrible state of intoxication.

Then the bridge case was taken up and explained in an able and satisfactory manner. The money plank in the democratic platform was weighed and found wanting, after which the tariff was discussed in an able and satisfactory manner, taking part of his illustrations from this state.

Then free coinage was discussed. Judge Field showed to the crowd Bryan's record on the silver question. "When the free silver bill was before congress," said Judge Field, Mr. Bryan did not lift his voice or even turn his hand to have the bill become a law, but sat in the halls of congress when he had two chances to go on record in favor of free coinage.

But he never lifted his voice until he crossed the river and entered upon this campaign and say anything about the free coinage or silver. It was only done then to catch the independent vote. When Bryan was speaking before the gold bugs in Tammany hall, Mr. Bryan then had a golden opportunity to go on record before that body, but not a word did he say in favor of the free coinage of silver.

The speech of Judge Field was the most powerful, most logical and presented more facts than any other, that has been delivered this campaign.

During the speech it was punctuated with loud and vigorous applause. The republicans of Cass county are in line, and they will see on next Tuesday that Judge Field goes to Washington to represent this misrepresented district.

ACCIDENT AT RULO.

It soon fell from the bridge dragging with it the rear five cars. Conductor Sommers had already jumped and so saved his life. The cars were piled up in an unrecognizable mass in the valley below, barely escaping a house where people were sleeping.

THE BANK FAILED.

The grand lodge Knight of Pythias of Nebraska has unfortunately met with the loss of the grand lodge funds. This state of affairs was caused by the failure of the bank of Ainsworth, of which the treasurer, Charles G. Alton, was cashier. The funds, amounting to about \$3,000, were deposited in the bank and when that institution was unexpectedly closed the funds went into the general wreck. Mr. Alton's bondsman having recently been caught in the Omaha barb wire failure, the grand lodge will probably not recover any part of the funds. Mr. Alton has been honored with the office of treasurer for five years. No blame whatever is attached to him in the unfortunate affair.
