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**Making clay pipes.**  
 The common clay pipe, like the needle, has to undergo a large number of operations before completion, nearly all of which are conducted without mechanical aid.

The clay, after being levigated, mixed and kneaded to a proper consistency, is rolled out roughly into shape. This the molder takes, and placing the head of bowl end on a special support thrusts a long needle into its center of the tail of the roll, thus piercing the stem.

Thus pierced, and still containing the needle, the roll is placed in the mold, which is of steel and made in two parts, and the latter is closed and put in the press. Then a compressor is pushed into the open part of the mold to form the bowl. Thus the clay is compressed.

The press is now opened, the pipe taken from the mold and passed on to finishers, who scrape out all mold seams, pass another needle into the stem, stamp any letters that are to appear and send on to the drying room.

Here, when sufficiently hardened, those which have to be polished are polished, and all are sent forward to other workmen, who examine them, reject the defective ones, and proceed to put the perfect ones in the saggars ready for the furnaces, which are similar to those used in potteries, and where they are exposed for five or six hours.

They are subsequently dipped in a mixture to remove the porosity of the clay. This is a mere outline of what is needed for a common clay pipe; the operations in the fancy patterns are more complicated.

**A Queer Cave.**  
 A dingy cave with several thousand tin cans for a roof, a pile of grimy blankets and gunny sacks stuffed with rags for a bed, a few old cans and broken brick against the clay bank for a fireplace—this is the habitat of an old man on Terwilliger's claim, about 800 feet north of the point where the west side Southern Pacific line crosses Slavin's road in South Portland. The cave is dug into the side of a steep hill and is sufficiently obscured by brush and trees to give the old man the seclusion he seems to desire.

The cave the old man lives in now is a marvel, considering the implements he had to work with. The only tool he used was a broken shovel, tied with wires in several places, with a handle that was once a sapling fir tree. He dug a hole about 14 feet long, ten feet wide and 12 feet deep, and as the bank is hard clay the amount of labor he performed may be imagined. A man with a good shovel could not remove such a quantity of earth in less than two or three weeks. The thousands of small cuts in the clay show that he took but a small amount of earth at a time, and gives some idea of the laborious task he had. The roof is made of a few crossbeams and flattened out oil cans, piled about twenty deep on top. Where he picked up such a quantity of oil cans is a mystery, as one dray could hardly carry them. The bedding consists of straw, old blankets, sacks and rags. A dog would hesitate before passing the night there.—Portland Oregonian.

**Reporting the Battle of Sedan.**  
 Sedan was marked by efforts of journalistic enterprise—crude, it is true, but indicative at least of energy. It was the New York Tribune which took "first spear." The wielder of the weapon was a Briton. Holt White, a man whose abilities should have given him a better fate than a premature death in an Austrian hospital, was with the Germans on the day so unfortunate for France. He stood by Sheridan when Napoleon's letter of surrender was handed by General Reille to old Wilhelm; the napkin that had constituted Reille's flag of truce was given him as a souvenir. And then with dauntless courage he walked right across the battlefield through the still glowing embers of the battle, reached the frontier, made for the nearest railway station and got to Brussels early next morning. He could not telegraph from there.

His own story was that when he tendered his message the people at the office refused to transmit it, scolding him as either a lunatic or a "beast" bent on creating a panic on the Stock exchange, but I have heard that he had not the cash with him to pay for a long message. Anyhow he came to London, getting there the day but one after the battle, in time for a short synopsis of his narrative to be printed in a late edition of the Pall Mall Gazette. It appeared at length in next morning's Tribune.—Archibald Forbes in Century.

**Gold Nugget Shaped Like a Hand.**  
 There have been many large and oddly shaped gold nuggets found in the United States and elsewhere, but the oddest of them all was that discovered at the Midhas mine on Sulky gully, near Melbourne, Australia, in 1887. The nugget was flat and almost the exact counterpart in contour of a colossal human hand held open, with the exception of the thumb and forefinger, which were closed together in a manner so as to make it appear that the thumb was holding the finger in place. Its greatest length was 12 1/2 inches and its greatest breadth 8 inches.

It was of the very purest gold, with but a little of foreign substances adhering (mostly between the "fingers") and weighed 617 ounces. It was found in the northwest main drive of the Midhas mine, 120 feet below the surface of the earth and at a spot only fifty feet from where the famous "Lady Brassey" nugget was discovered the year before. It weighed fifty one pounds of pure gold, worth \$25 per pound.—St. Louis Republic.

**She Becomes Real Interested.**  
 Mrs. General Custer devotes the greater part of her time to reading in public a paper called "The Plains."

In the course of this paper she describes a hunt out of a western camp or post. Mrs. Custer is a good hunter and has often accompanied her husband on these expeditions. She says that when reading the description she practically goes through the whole thing. She hears the horn, the dogs, the calls of the men, the clatter of hoofs. She feels the motion of her horse, sees the stretch of prairie and is thrilled by the excitement of the chase.

At the end she is as tired as if she had really spent hours in the saddle, and can scarcely bring herself back to the realities of her surroundings.—New York Recorder.

**In Westminster Abbey.**  
 A party of American tourists who visited London recently, while passing through Westminster abbey, passed reverently before the bust of Longfellow which stands upon the wall in the poet's corner.

One of the visitors, a young girl, with tears in her eyes, placed a rose in the folds of drapery across the old poet's breast. They passed on. Presently they missed a child who belonged to the party. On searching for her they found her lying before the bust. She had fallen off one of her little curls and laid it beside the rose.

"It is the only American here," she said "and it was all I had to give."—Youth's Companion.

**Getting the Most Out of the Horse.**  
 The art of getting the most out of horse flesh on the line of march is one which needs study and practice to every whit the same extent as do race riding or the haute école, and therefore feats of endurance should form part of an officer's education as well as those upon the tin or between the flags.

To cover many miles with success a man must, first of all, study his own condition, and while he makes his charger fit must not forget to render himself so too. He should carefully watch how his horse takes its food, and vary the amount of it, the time of feeding and the nature of forage, so as to insure that the animal derives the maximum amount of benefit from the nourishment it takes.

Then he should endeavor by experiment to discover the pace which suits its conformation best and the most judicious manner of varying it, so as to afford relief to the muscles and yet get over the ground.

The particular pace that best suits the animal having been arrived at, it should be trained to do that pace evenly and methodically and with the regularity of a machine. And care should be taken never to stretch the bow to the utmost, or the subsequent reaction will more than counterbalance the present gain.—London Saturday Review.

**Scavengers of Conversation.**  
 "Deliver me from what some author has called the 'scavengers of daily conversation,' who gather up the literary refuse on every side to offend the intellectual nostrils of the thoughtful." And Colonel Marcus Bauerman stretched himself in his chair and proceeded to explain.
