How Some Famous Composers Were Paid For Their Brilliant Creations.

Handel, had it not been for his oratorios and his operatic speculations, would have lived and died as poor as the proverbial church mouse. Walsh, his publisher, paid him pitiful prices for his operas. For at least 11 of these works he received no more than 25 guineas each, and the largest sum he was ever paid was only £105, which he got for "Alexander's Feast." It must not be thought from these small prices that the composer's works did not sell. On the contrary, they always found a ready market and proved a great source of prefit to the publisher. From the proceeds of his first opera, "Rinaldo," Walsh netted a profit of over £1,500, whereupon Handel jocularly remarked to the music seller, "Well, you shall compose the next opera, and I will publish it."
