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DRY EVENING CUTTING AFFRAY

QUARREL BETWEEN TWO YOUNG MEN ENDS SERIOUSLY.

George Stadler and Joe Preis Engage in a Quarrel in Which the Former is Stabbed—Sheriff Holloway in Search of the Would-Be Assassin—Other News About Town.

An affray at Cedar Creek Sunday evening, in which bad whiskey formed an inconsiderable part, Geo. Stadler, son-in-law of Frank Busche, was lously carved up by a young man named Joe Preis. No one seems to know the special reasons for the affray, but Stadler has ample proof that trouble existed. The fleshy part of his shoulder is laid bare to the bone, and another dangerous wound was made in his side.

Deputy Sheriff F. A. Murphy hurried to the scene of carnage last night to find the man who did the cutting had fled for parts unknown. The officer went over to Fritz Wagner's this morning, where Preis had worked, but he had not been there and is evidently hiding among relatives.

Both men are said to have been under the influence of liquor at the time. Sheriff Holloway will make an effort to capture Mr. Preis, and by example put a stop to Cedar Creek lawlessness, which has been too common lately to suit the law-abiding people of that community.

A SPLENDID BANQUET

This will only come with the employment of the masses, and such employment is certain to follow the re-establishment of a wise protective policy which shall encourage manufacturing at home. Protection has lost none of its virtue and importance. The first duty of the republican party if restored to power in the country, will be the enactment of a tariff law which will raise all the money necessary to conduct the government, economically and honestly administered, and so adjusted as to give preference to home manufactures and adequate protection to home labor and the home market."
