"Can Tax Payers Afford It" (?) The above caption appeared over an article in the last issue of the Weeping Water Republican, which is so full of error and gross misstatements with relation to the building of a jail that we can not let it pass unnoticed. In the first place the county treasury contains over \$65,000 at the present time, and the sum by July 1st will reach over \$100,000, just as it did last year, as the people are paying their taxes even better than they did last year. It is not true, that only the general fund could be drawn from, as any man who knows anything about county affairs must know. There is a fund called the court house bond fund, which is designed to pay interest on the court house bonds. The interest has been paid for this year, (having been paid in January) and there is still \$11,000 left over in this fund, which will be increased as people pay their taxes. There are numerous other funds which could as easily be drawn from. Its rather foolish to say that this money must come from the general fund only, when these other unused funds can be turned into the general fund any time by resolution of the board so that the first claim, if true would have no weight. Here is a fair sample of the Republican's logic: "If our county was in such a good financial condition as they would have us believe, it would not be necessary for the county commissioners to advertise that the property that was several years in arrears for taxes would be sold, and many who have been unable the past few years to pay are now losing their property. But this is being done and many good citizens in the county are making an extra effort to square up." The idea that the commissioners are collecting delinquent taxes because the treasury is bankrupt is a new one. We supposed the board was only doing its duty, and was not placing a premium on dead-bents by allowing them to get along without paying any taxes, while the industrious paid for the running of county business. The delinquents are being made to pay, but there are people who might draw a salary of \$4,000 per year and yet be too profligate to pay taxes until forced to do so by distress warrant or sale of property. Should such men be allowed to go tax free while others bear the burdens? Most people would say not. The flings at the sheriff are entirely uncalled for, as anyone who would investigate for a moment would know. The office has never been more carefully managed, and jail deliveries have not been more frequent than heretofore, though the jail itself is settling and becoming more worthless as the days go by. A fine saw could be gotten into the wonderful cage at any hour in the day or night from the outside without the officers knowing anything about it, and as to searching prisoners; every man is thoroughly searched for the personal safety of the jailor if for no other reason. Our brother editor is making a strained effort to array the county against this city, that's all there is in the anti-jail sentiment promulgated with so much vigor by our neighbor. As a matter of fact the new jail is of no more interest to this town than to any other part of the county except that the utter worthlessness of the old one is better known here. It makes no difference to our people whether we have a jail with a man sard roof or one 10x12 just so it holds the criminals placed therein for safe keeping. If a man committed a murder or burglary in Tipton precinct and after great expense he was caught, the people there would have more interest in his punishment than we would have. The erection of a new jail out of funds already available is purely a business matter and no odd county seat feeling can be injected into it. We have the money laying idle now; the jail is badly needed at this time; labor and material will never be cheaper than now; then why not erect a jail that would be a credit to the county before the old one falls down.
