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Due to the Protective Tariff.
The Bemis Brothers Bag company, the largest bag manufacturing concern in the world, with factories at Omaha, St. Louis, Minneapolis, West Superior and New Orleans, have decided to reach out and enter a new field early next spring. At that time the company will open a factory in San Francisco.

Yesterday, in speaking of the decision to establish a bag factory on the Pacific coast, M. C. Peters, local manager of the Bemis Bros. Bag company said: "Plans have been completed whereby we will open a factory in San Francisco for the manufacture of all kinds of bags. At the start the plant will give employment to not less than 100 persons, which number will undoubtedly be increased very materially as the work progresses."

"The Pacific coast country uses annually about 30,000,000 jute sacks of different sizes, all of which, with the exception of about 4,000,000, come from India. Under the provisions of the the Wilson tariff law we could not compete with the cheap labor of Asia and consequently were unable to manufacture on the Pacific coast. The McKinley law, passed at the last session of congress, has afforded protection to American labor and now we feel justified in branching out and establishing this new factory. For a time we shall rent buildings in San Francisco, but eventually we expect to build and put in as complete a plant as there is in the world."—Bec.

Shipping Engines to Europe.
MILWAUKEE, Wis., Sept. 29.—The Reliance works of the E. P. Allis company of this city have closed a contract for foreign orders aggregating \$500,000. Twenty-one engines of an average horse power of 1,200 each are to be built for foreign trade. Six engines of 1,500 horse power each are being built for the Central London underground railway, a new electric road in London. Six have been ordered for Dublin tramways, which will furnish 1,000 horse power each to propel electric cars over the old tramway. Three engines of 1,000 horse power will enable the Barcelona authorities to put electric cars on their tramways. Two duplicate engines will be sent to Madrid, Spain, for the tramways there.

Stock Moving Eastward.
BELL FLOUR, S. D., Sept. 29.—All incoming trains from the east are delayed from one to three hours in reaching Black Hill points owing to the large number of cattle trains moving eastward. Stock trains without any exceptions have the right of way going eastward. Even the fast mail train from Chicago to Omaha is sidetracked at regular intervals to allow the stock trains to pass. At a meeting of the stockholders of the Northwestern held recently the matter of laying a double track from Missouri Valley across Iowa to Clinton was favorably considered. Shipments will continue from this place until cold weather. Eighteen trains were sent out Sunday.

Emperors Will Not Intervene.
LONDON, Sept. 29.—The Berlin correspondent of the Daily News says: The statement that the German and Austrian emperors have decided to intervene between the United States and Spain is unfounded. Public opinion here favors Spain, but there is no question of the German cabinet making itself a cat paw for Spain, while Austrian diplomats will not allow its foreign policies to be influenced by certain dynastic interests.

The suit of the state against the bondsmen of ex-treasurer Bartley for over half a million dollars is now on trial at Omaha to a Douglas county jury. The defendants are J. S. Bartley, F. M. Cook, A. B. Clark, John H. Ames, Charles A. Hanna, Mary Fitzgerald, Ed J. Fitzgerald, all of Lincoln; C. C. McNish of Wisner, E. E. Brown and Nathan S. Harwood of Lincoln; Thos. Swobe, Cadet Taylor, and William A. Paxton, Omaha.

The simon pure populists of Lancaster county have called a meeting of all the middle-of-the-road pops October 4 to nominate a county ticket.

The case brought by Squaw Man Tibbles against the railroads of the state charging them with maintaining too high a rate of freight has been deferred until after election. It comes up before the populist board of transportation and the members thereof do not want to act until after the battle, mother. They don't feel like offending either the people or the roads, and especially the latter.

The Chicago street railway strike that has been threatened for several days was declared off yesterday for the present.

The Iowa & Nebraska Telephone company, which has invaded this state by way of Sioux City, is negotiating to extend its wires to Bancroft. It promises that rates will be reduced from 30 to 50 per cent by the new company.

The Trans-Mississippi Gold Mining company of Schuyler has received the thrilling intelligence that a strike has been made on its property at Woodland Park, Col., which shows samples of ore going \$20,000 to the ton.

Congressman Dolliver, of Iowa, has a happy faculty of putting political points most pithily. He, it was who first said McKinley was the advance agent of prosperity. In a speech Saturday he said, "At Chicago they broke into the headquarters of the democratic party and stole the name of a time-honored party and have since been doing a populist business on democratic letterheads."
