BEGINS PROTECTING ITS BRIDGES

Work Being Done at Plattsmouth and Quincy By the B. & M.
The Burlington will soon begin the work of filling in under the east trestle of its railroad bridge across the Missouri river between Plattsmouth and East Plattsmouth. The preliminary work has been begun. The undertaking is a large one and will involve the expenditure of about \$30,000. It was stated at the B. & M. headquarters here yesterday that when the Burlington constructed its bridges across the Missouri river it was the intention to later fill in under the trestle work of all the bridges. This work has already been done at the bridges across the river at Nebraska City and at Rulo. The work of filling in will be on the east side of the river only, as the west end of the big bridge runs directly on a high bluff.
The same work is about to begin at Quincy, Ill., where the Burlington's big bridge across the Mississippi river is being rebuilt. There the six spans of the bridge underneath which it is desired to fill in are on the east side also. Part of the spans are over the river and part of the low bank. A petition from the Quincy merchants has been sent to Secretary of War Alger asking that permission be given the Burlington to fill in the six eastern spans of its bridge there. It is stated in the petition that the filling in and closing of the six spans of the bridge will, by confining the river to a more narrow channel, assist navigation and improve the harbor.—Bec.

LETTER FROM ALASKA.

Will L. Sampson Writes of His Trip to the Klondike.

[The following letter from W. L. Sampson to his sister, Mrs. Crehan, will be of interest to that gentleman's friends in this city.]

SUMMIT OF CHULCOOT PASS, Sept. 6.—I am away up on the summit of this range of mountains, and a bleak, desolate place it is, too—not a stick of wood within three miles, as wood is worth 15 cents per pound. This is as big an undertaking as any man ever attempted and got through with. A man should have \$500 in cash besides his outfit in order to get through with any degree of comfort and speed. I have about half of our outfit over the summit, and it will take about four days to get the balance over. Church and one of the boys have gone over to Lake Linderman to build the boat—don't know how long it will take to get through.

The weather is fine on the mountains today, and it makes the travel much better. But you cannot imagine what it is to get over the pass until you see it—for a man to pack one hundred pounds on his back over this mountain seems an impossibility, yet hundreds of men are doing it every day, and I am making three trips per day. About ten more days' of grief will let me through with this part of it, and if I don't make a stake when I get there it will not be because I haven't earned it. I will bid you good bye for this time, as I am about frozen—think of hundreds of feet of snow all around me and no wood for fuel! Will send this letter by Joe Johnson and Kilgore, who have given it up and will return home.

HAPPY CAMP, [Five miles from Summit,] Sept. 11.—Our supplies are all over the Summit on the banks of Crater Lake, and will be ferried over as soon as the storm which is now on is over. It has been storming for over three days, but has the appearance of clearing up. The boys have gone over the pass today to bring our horses over, and we think that it will take us one week more to reach Lake Linderman, and our boat is or will be built and ready by the time we get there. It rains or storms most all the time on these mountains, but the weather is fine down on the big lakes, and I will thank God when I get there.

If I ever come through on this trip again I will know how to come and what to bring. If I got a good claim I want you and the folks to come in next year, and I will write you how to come. I don't think there is any doubt but what we will get in this fall in good shape, but there are thousands that won't. It is a hard proposition for a man to get an outfit over this trail without plenty of money. There will be lots of money made whip-sawing lumber on Lake Benn at this winter to build boats for the spring rush—boats sell now from \$400 and up, and it only takes about 250 feet for a boat.

I would like to hear from you all, but guess I am too far along. We had our pictures taken this morning—it will be sent to you by way of Dawson City, when I get in. Well, good bye. Your loving brother,
