LOS ANGELES, Cal., Feb. 10.—Ninety carloads of oranges are leaving southern California every day for the east. As 300 boxes of 200 oranges fill each car, the shipments represent nearly 5,500,000 oranges every twenty-four hours. Shipments are particularly heavy from the new district of Redlands, where the orange groves are just coming into full bearing. Though frosts injured many oranges on lowlands, most of the groves in Riverside, San Bernardino and Los Angeles counties escaped with trifling loss.
