BARTLEY STILL HELD IN JAIL.

Mandate From the Supreme Court Not
Received in Omaha.

"Forty days from the rising of the
court," at the sitting of which Joseph
S. Bartley was condemned by the su-
preme tribunal of Nebraska to under-
go the sentence and penalty passed
upon him by the district court in
Douglas county, expire today, says
the Omaha Bee. Those forty days
were supposed to limit the time of
Bartley's stay in the Douglas county
jail; but he will be among us, though
not of us for yet a few days. Sheriff
McDonald has as yet received no
copy of the mandate from the su-
preme court ordering the removal of
the prisoner from the jail to the peni-
tentiary, and it is apparent that he
will not for some days to come. Last
week Bartley's attorneys filed a mo-
tion for a rehearing with the supreme
court, and this matter remains to be
passed upon. It is understood that
Clerk Campbell of the supreme court
rules that the filing of the motion acts
as a stop to the issuance of the man-
date necessary to carry the sentence
into effect, and that there will be no
issue until the motion has been dis-
posed of by the court.

At the time the supreme court
handed down its opinion affirming the
findings and sentence of the lower
court there were rumors that Bartley
would make an attempt to escape from
custody of the sheriff. It was said
that he might take advantage of the
degree of liberty that was accorded
him during his appeal to the supreme
court and make his escape from the
county jail. These rumors have so
far proved groundless. When the
sentence of the trial court was af-
firmed, Bartley was shorn of his privi-
leges and was removed to the strong-
est part of the jail. He was given no
special consideration whatever. While
his stay in Omaha may be a little
more prolonged, he will be kept as
secure as any other of the men de-
tained against their will in jail.

Chased a Wolf.

Engineer Moore of the Schuyler
run, had an exciting chase after a
wolf last Saturday as he pulled his
train toward Ashland about two miles
this side of the town. The wolf was
one of the big gray fellows and he
rather liked the middle of the track,
and did not care to give it up to the
iron horse. He seemed to get over
the ground at a lively pace, and the
engineer opened the throttle wide and
then for a half mile no wolf in Ne-
braska ever ran faster, Moore says
he would have caught the animal in
a few rods more, as it was giving out,
but it dodged off at the side of the track
just in time to escape the wheels. Its
hair was all on end, making it look as
large as a sheep, and had it been
night time and Frank had been afoot
he probably would have taken his
wolfship for a bear. He says rabbits
are often killed by the engine in at-
tempting to cross the track ahead of
it, but he never killed but one wolf,
and he caught that one on a bridge.

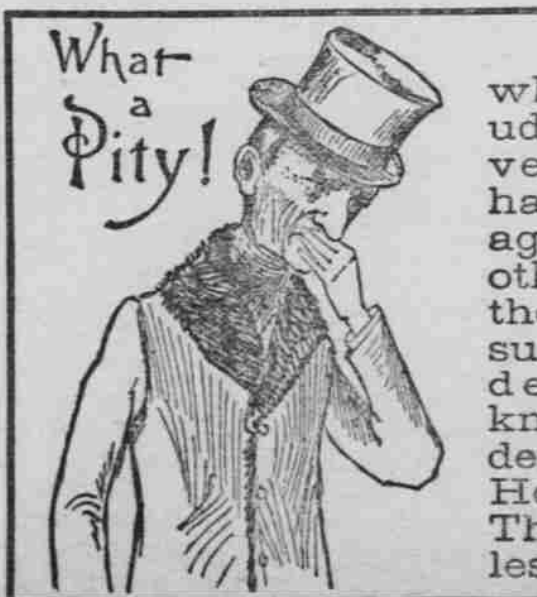
