## HOLD THEIR ANNUAL CONVENTION.

J. O. U. A. M's. in Session in Platts-mouth Today.

Discuss Important Matters Pertaining to the Order and Elect Officers—City Fathers Hold a Special Meeting to Confer With Representatives of a Chicago Magazine.

The Seventh annual state meeting of the Junior Order of United American Mechanics was held in this city today. The day was spent in discussing various topics in regard to the order, its growth, etc. While the order is not very large in this state, it has a national membership of over 200,000, and it is steadily increasing. The object of this organization is to "assist Americans in obtaining employment, and to maintain and promote the interests of Americans and shield them from the depressing effects of foreign competition."

A large number of visiting delegates were in attendance, and helped to make the convention very interesting and successful one.

**A Social Meeting.**  
A special meeting of the city council was held last evening. All the members were present except Cummins.

The primary object of the meeting was to confer with a number of representatives of the Campbell Publishing company of Chicago. These gentlemen stated that they wished to secure out of the principal buildings in this city, and asked the council to make an appropriation towards securing the same—not stating a specific amount. They said the B. & M. officials intended having cuts made of their shop buildings, also the water works company, and that they had already made arrangements for the use of the same. The circulation of the Illustrated Journal, the magazine they represented, was estimated at 158,000—50,000 of which would be distributed in Omaha. However, after some discussion, the council decided to take no action for the present, and the matter was laid on the table.

A representative of the Boston Rubber Co. was present and displayed some specimens of hose, but as this was an informal meeting, no action could be taken.

The council then adjourned.

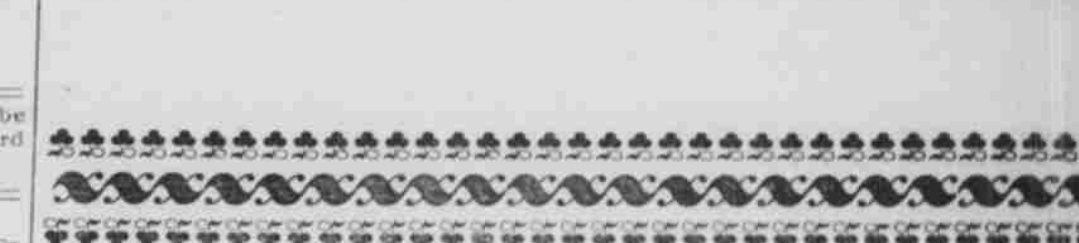

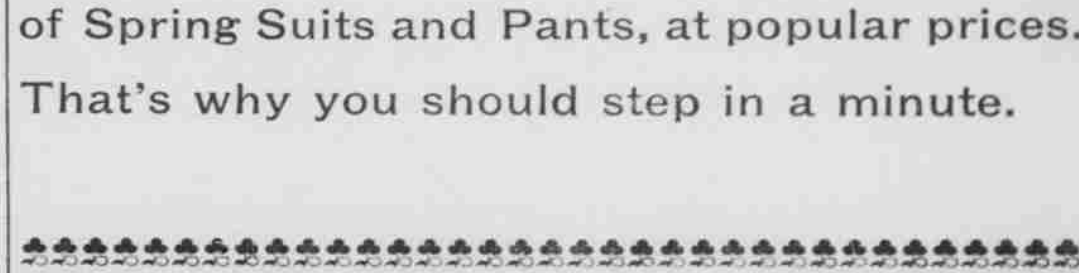
