A LITTLE CHILD BURNED TO DEATH

While Playing About a Bonfire Last Night.

HER SUFFERINGS WERE INTENSE

But Death Came to the Child's Relief Today at 10 O'Clock The Mother Also Badly Burned—A Big Business Transfer.

The home of August Richter, night watchman at the shops, was thrown in mourning last evening over the death of their bright little three-year-old daughter, Emma. Last night about 7 o'clock Emma, with the other children of the household and some neighbor children, had built a little bonfire of straw and weeds in the dooryard near the house. The other children were carrying little bits of straw to keep the fire going while Emma was poking at the burning mass with a stick. A gust of wind whipped the child's dress over the fire and instantly she was wrapped in flames. The screams of the fated child and her companions brought the mother to the scene, who attempted to save her little one by removing the clothing. "Buck" Neigh, who was passing the house, seeing the child's predicament, took off his coat, wrapped it about her and smothered the flames, not, however, before the clothing had been nearly burned off and the body burned almost to a crisp. The flesh hung from the little arms in shreds, the face burned almost beyond recognition and she was badly burned internally from inhaling the flames.

Emma was carried into the house by tender hands and medical aid summoned. Dr. Schildknecht, on arriving at the home, realized at once that she was beyond all human power to save, and directed his efforts to the relief of her sufferings as far as possible until death would come to give her relief. During the night she was alternately rational and delirious. Sometimes she would talk of her burning clothes, at others she would call cheerfully to her companions as she was wont to do in her childish play, while again her screams were fairly heartrending. The agonized parents watched over the little sufferer and tenderly ministered to her till the end came, at 10 o'clock this morning.

In trying to remove the clothing from the little girl the mother's hands and face and neck were badly burned, and she will be unable to attend to her household duties for many days.

The funeral will occur tomorrow—Wednesday—at 2 o'clock, from the family residence on Lincoln avenue, southwest of the shops.

A \$10,000 Transfer.
