**WAR IS INEVITABLE.**

Unconditional Surrender Alone Can Prevent It.

**MUST RELINQUISH ALL CLAIMS**

To Cuba or Fight—Spain Will Never Accede—War Preparations are Progressing Steadily in Both Countries—News of Local Interest.

WASHINGTON, April 8, 2:30 p. m.— [Special to the News.] Preparations for war are steadily going on in both this country and Spain. Congress has adjourned until Monday, and though public sentiment is more quiet here and there, it is temporarily allayed, war feeling hourly growing stronger.

American are leaving Havana as fast as ships can carry them. Minister Woodford has been ordered not to leave Madrid yet for a few days pending further negotiations.

All indications point more strongly than ever to war. In fact there is no possible chance for peace unless Spain will at once relinquish all claims to Cuba which means complete and unconditional surrender on the part of that country, which is admitted in diplomatic and military circles here that she will never do.

**Returned From Honduras.**

S. J. Atwood and wife returned last evening after a months absence, during which time they visited New Orleans and went by steamer to Honduras and Guatemala in Central America. Mr. Atwood reports a delightful time and says Honduras is a good country to live in. They stopped at Belize and went up into the country on a river steamer. Banana raising is a great industry down there, the ship which brought them home carried forty cars of the fruit. Mahogany was as cheap and common as cottonwood used to be here and was utilized for fence building and other cheap work. The soil was very rich and wonderfully productive. Three crops of corn can be grown in one year, and sugar cane is planted but once, the cane is cut, and new stalks grow up. There was no end of delicious tropical fruits, the mango custard apple and many others that a northerner never tasted. Some of the finest coffee plantations in the world are found in Guatemala. Mr. Atwood was delighted with what he saw, the trip being his first one into the tropics. They were both in the best of health during the entire trip and came home from a ten thousand mile jaunt, none the worse for their outing.

**At the Commissioner's Office.**

The board today ordered a new twenty-eight foot bridge built on the ferry road and work will commence on it tomorrow. In a few days it will be ready for travel, much to the satisfaction of the public.

On petition of a number of citizens the commissioners today closed a contract with Matthew Gering wherein the attorney undertakes to have the clerk's judgment set aside for a fee of \$250. This amount includes the costs involved in the further prosecution of the case, if he does not succeed the attorney is to pay nothing—no more no pay.

The building and loan associations of the city have in the past few days paid over to the county \$1,000 delinquent taxes on several pieces of property in this city which means that the association will foreclose on the property. There are a number of other delinquents who might save foreclosure by paying up in the next few days.

Will Revoke His Certificate.

Mr. Hoppel, the Cedar Creek school teacher, who found it good policy to marry one of his four-year-old pupils was asked by the board to resign his school. This he refused to do. Another teacher was fired but Hoppel continued to hold the fort.

Superintendent Farley was appointed to by the residents of the district and he fired the recalcitrant pedagogues, but he still refused to go. Today the superintendent went to Cedar Creek where he will revoke Hoppel's certificate and thus stop his further attempt to teach in this community.

**The Denver Biennial.**

In brief the subjects to be considered at the Biennial will be as follows:—"Home," Phases of Economic Work in Clubs," "Education," "Art," "The Library Movement in the United States," "The Industrial Problem as it affects Women and Children," "Civic Clubs and Village Improvement Associations" and "Folk Songs of America."

In addition there will be conferences on club methods at which practical questions to clubs (large and small) will be considered. Practical phases of all the questions will be the subjects of discussion. For instance, in the Art meeting such subjects as "The Decoration of School buildings," and "What an Art Club can do for a Community" will be discussed. At the Press meeting at which Mrs. Heron will preside, such themes as "How to secure the Cooperation of the Press with Aesthetic Movements," "Shall the Club publish its News," etc., will be taken up. Some of the best lady journalists in the country will be the speakers.

At the Library meeting accounts of the work done by clubs all over the country in the way of public and travelling libraries, will be given. At the Educational conference Margaret E. Evans, president of the Minnesota Federation and principal of Carleton college, will preside. Mrs. Cornelius Stevenson, the famous Egyptologist, will have charge of the meeting on Civic Clubs. She is president of the noted Civic club of Philadelphia, which has been so potent a factor in the municipal life of that city. At the Industrial meeting Clara de Griffo and Mrs. A. P. Stevens, two of the most noted labor statisticians of the country will speak, also Mary Kenney O'Sullivan, president of the Boston Union for Industrial Progress.

On Sunday, June 23, twelve principal pulpits of Denver will be filled by such preachers as Celia Parker Woolley, and Caroline Bartlett Crane, and such speakers as Jane Addams, Mrs. Cornelius Stevenson and Mrs. Mary Solomon, president of the National Council of Jewish Women.
