The Militia to Be Called Tomorrow.

## SENATE SO FAR ONLY TALKS.

A Vote Not Yet Reached on the Resolutions—50,000 Troops to Rendezvous at Chattanooga—Looking for Cattle Thieves.

WASHINGTON, April 14, 3:00 p. m.—[Special to the NEWS]—It is today authoritatively stated that the state militia will be called out to rendezvous at Chattanooga 50,000 strong, tomorrow or Monday, to be ready for immediate action.

The senate has spent the entire day in discussing the Cuban resolutions and at this time no decision has been reached. The senate remains in session and it is thought a vote will be taken before adjournment.
