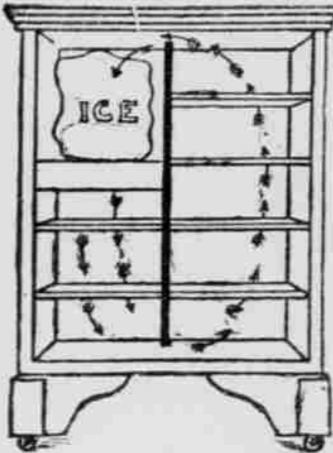

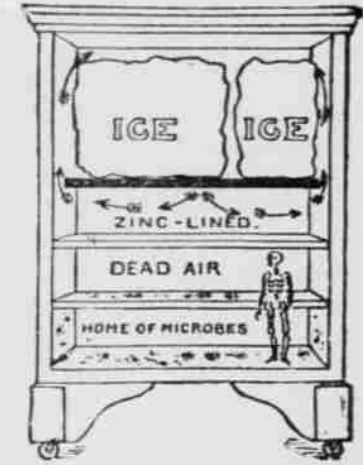

FIGHTING AT SANTIAGO.

The Great Battle Begun at Daylight This Morning, and the Americans Pressing Forward.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 1. Sampson cables the navy department that he is cooperating with the army. This is understood to mean that he will force an entrance into the harbor at once.

A dispatch from Shafter says, fighting began at daylight, and the Spaniards are being slowly driven back.

Fleet Bombarde Morro, SANTIAGO DE CUBA, July 1.—11:20 a. m.—A general assault was begun this morning. General Lawson advanced and took possession of Carbona, a suburb of Santiago.

Morro Castle and the other forts and the entrance of the harbor were bombarded by our fleet. The Vesuvius used her dynamite guns with good effect. The Spanish fleet in the harbor fired on the American troops who were very close to the city. Hard fighting all along the American line was in progress at 11 o'clock. Nine wounded Cubans have been brought in.

Troops Arrive. Siboney, June 30, via Playa Del Este.—The transport Louisiana arrived this evening with troops. The transport Mobile, after a mistaken chase and runaway by Vixen, arrived tonight. The cruisers Newark and Harvard also arrived tonight. All had troops, which will debark at dawn.

Company B from Plattsmouth, which reached Fort Omaha yesterday, took noon mess with company H from Stromsburg. George L. Sheldon, a farmer living at Nehawka, is the captain of company B. He graduated at the university of Nebraska with a captain's commission in 1892 and is also a graduate of Harvard. The first lieutenant is Oscar H. Allen, also a farmer living near Wabash, and a graduate of the state university in 1895. The second lieutenant is C. A. Rawls, a Plattsmouth attorney. He and Captain Sheldon are the only married men in company B. The first sergeant is R. E. Finney, cashier of the First National bank at Weeping Water. The men in this company have been drilled by the captain and the lieutenants.—Omaha World-Herald.

Plenty of Horse Thieves. Sheriff Wheeler is flooded with letters giving descriptions of stolen horses from all over the country. One horse and buggy were stolen from Lancaster county this week, making eleven horses in all during the last month stolen from this county. Cass has fared very well indeed no horses having been stolen here for several months unless one missing from Elmwood has been stolen. The horse is three years old and the owner thinks it has been led away.

Recruits Wanted. Lieutenant Rawls is here today from Fort Omaha, looking for recruits to fill up the ranks of company B, made necessary by reason of the twenty-four men who failed to pass the examination.

EXCURSION TO WASHINGTON.

Attractions of the National Educational Association.

The meeting of the national education association at Washington, July 7 to 12, promises to be one of more than ordinary interest. The general meetings are to be divided and will offer a choice of program. The quality of the program of the general and the special meetings alike has never been surpassed. As to the city itself, it is a place every American should visit and study. As congress will probably be in session, there could be no more favorable time than while it is the center of the great preparations now in progress for the war with Spain. Even if congress should adjourn, there would remain the attraction of the work of the departments which will not relax during the continuance of the war. In addition to the many places of interest in Washington, arrangements have been made for railroad and boat excursions to all points of interest in the east coast.

Arrangements have been made for meals for the regular excursion party between Chicago and Washington at 50 cents each. Those not wishing meals can avail themselves of the lunch counters. Those desiring sleeping car arrangements should write the member of the committee of the initial route. Those who desire to join the party whether teachers or not should inform the committee in order to insure arrangements for their accommodation.
