WHEN reformers turn Judge Maxwell down to take up a fellow like Robinson for congress they unwittingly display their dishonesty, and ought to open the eyes of farmers who are honest in their convictions about inaugurating real reforms.

ACCORDING to General Shafter the silver question settled itself very quickly in San Diego after he got in there with his men. Probably the Spaniards had not heard of the election of McKinley a few months ago, that made the American silver dollar the peer of any other dollar in the world. Few newspapers are taken in that town.—Ex.

THE democratic conventions are just now complimenting McKinley for the magnificent prosecution of the war which has taught the effete monarchies how an American can rise equal to any emergency. The democratic conventions are wiser than some of their camp followers in trying to prevent the war issue being all in favor of the republican party.

It is quite remarkable that Dewey opened the war with a big victory and closed it with another which was really the finish of his first conflict in the bay of Manila. In both engagements he did not lose a man, while the enemy lost hundreds in killed and wounded. In his reports the great commander is as modest as Grant, and briefly gives results without an attempt at self adulation. It certainly looks as though he would be a fit successor to President McKinley.

THE "reform forces" have shown the hollow mockery and sham of their pretensions by turning down Judge Maxwell, who was a true independent reformer, and naming in his stead W. V. Allen's law partner, Judge Robinson. Maxwell, however much we might object to his silver fallacies, has stood for clean government and clean officials. His course while in congress was above reproach, so far as his party was concerned, but the state house ring, with Allen at the head, wanted Robinson and Maxwell was kicked out sans ceremony.

EDGERTON, Edmisten and Laws are for Poynter for governor, yet Poynter is on record as opposing the railway commission which keeps the above three worthless in bread and butter, as well as passes for their friends. Will these three men give up a good job, or is Poynter playing a false role in his opposition to the railway commission force. Anyone of average intelligence who knows Poynter say his oil room and railway friends are not worrying over his attitude. His farmers votes he wants at any cost, and when he gets them the Edmisten and other jobbers will be handsomely cared for.

THE protocol signed on the twelfth of August at Washington will make great work for the map makers. Not a map in all the world now correctly defines the territorial limits of the United States of Spain. Nor will it be possible to do so with entire accuracy until the work of the peace commissioners has been completed. What will be the color assigned to Cuba,

what to the island of Luzon, what to the other islands? One thing only is sure, for the first time in 400 years not a patch of the western hemisphere will bear the yellow that usually given to Spanish possessions.—New York Times.

The Saunders county populist organ prints some stunts not about how the editor of this breezid companion tried to, and did, run a part of the recent populist convention held at Louisville. The democratic organ of this city is authority for the statement that this awful marplot performed the same service on the same day at Weeping Water in the republican county convention. And so it goes—and are seldom understood until they have passed to the other sphere. Both the above papers provoked, of course, as no attempt was made to interfere with anyone's choice, and we had all we could do to just vote our sentiments as a delegate from the first ward every time the roll was called.
