The body of Mrs. C. A. Moore, whose clothing was found on the river bank at Fourth and Jones streets August 20, was recovered last night by three fishermen who were rowing on the river below the Union Pacific bridge. The men were Z. Zeleek, Joe Konthal and Frank Burness, Bohemians, who live on the river bank. They were rowing up the current when they noticed the body in a strong eddy close to the shore. It was attired in the usual clothing, with the exception of the overskirt and shoes, which had been left upon the river bank.  
The coroner was notified and took charge of the body. Mr. Moore called later and identified the dead woman as his wife. He will return with the body to his home at Silver City, Ia., and no inquest will be held.
