### A BIG FUSION FIZZLE

The White Metal Democrats  
Try to Mix Medicine With  
Populists.

### SOME VERY SLIM CONVENTIONS.

The State Ticket Goes Through Without  
Scratch. Democrats Take What They  
Want and Leave the Rest to the  
Pops.

WEeping Water, Neb., Sept. 6, 1898, 4 p. m. (Special to THE NEWS.)—The slimmest county convention ever held in this city was that of the pops, and democrats today. The silver Republicans could not organize, as only three delegates responded, viz: Jno. Leyda, Royford and Rocco Walker. The populists met in the forenoon and organized by the election of J. P. Rouse chairman, with Ed. Fildon secretary.

A conference committee consisting of J. W. Kenson and others was appointed and the convention then took a recess until after the float convention reported.

The float convention met and organized by electing Moran chairman, and B. E. Allen secretary, and appointed the usual conference committee.

The democratic county convention met in the opera house and Mattie Geing was made chairman, and B. L. Kirkham secretary. After a conference committee was appointed, J. M. Patton was nominated for the state senate, Fred Gorder for the house and D. O. Dwyer was named for county attorney. The democrats then took a recess to wait on the float convention and see if the pops were ready to take their medicine.

John Leyda's convention with its three members did not cut much ice. The ticket will not be completed for some time.

Omaha Needs More Stock.  
Omaha live stock receipts, while showing a very gratifying increase over last year, are not large enough to supply the demand. Practically nothing has been shipped from here to Chicago the past sixty days. Local packers have taken everything offered and wanted more. If western stockmen would send more of their stock to Omaha and less to Chicago their net returns would show considerable improvement. When receipts are big at Chicago and the market lower in consequence, it is safe to assume that the market will be lower here even in spite of comparatively small receipts and a good demand. On the other hand with light receipts at Chicago the market is very apt to be stronger here and it is safe to figure that the market will be stronger at Omaha, even if receipts should be unusually heavy. The moral of all this is very evident. Send more stock to Omaha and less to Chicago and the average price is bound to be better all around. Shippers should keep this fact in mind and always remember that the demand here is now more than sufficient to take care of any receipts, however large they may be.—Drovers Journal.

Long Distance Telephone.  
Plattsmouth is now on the long distance telephone line, and people here can converse with friends in Boston, New York, Chicago, and other eastern cities with as much satisfaction as if they were only a few blocks away. The long distance telephone company entered Omaha only a year ago and is already doing a good business, and superseding the telegraph in many instances. One firm reports by telephons every morning to its correspondent in Boston. Mr. Arthur S. Rodgers, the affable representative of the company was in the city today and made the News a pleasant call.

Death of Louis Schicketzanz.  
Louis Schicketzanz who resided when a small boy in this city, has been a resident of Council Bluffs for several years. While attempting to board a motor train there, which was running rapidly, he fell under the wheels and was instantly killed. He was a nephew of Henry Boeck of this city. Mr. Boeck and wife went to Council Bluffs this morning to attend the funeral.

Sweet Scented Harmony.  
The democrats with their pop allies went over to Weeping Water this morning to go through the form of nominating a county ticket, which was really named by the state housing several days ago. Not a single populist delegate from this city took part in the fusion deal, and only a handful from out in the county were there to pledge the populist support to the machine made ticket. No ticket in the last 30 years history of the county was ever nominated by a less representative crowd, and there is not the slightest danger that any of them will be elected. The pops of the east end of the county refused to take part in the proceedings, and will not be bound to support the ticket—in fact they will not do it, and the republican majority may be set down at from 500 to 1,000 in old Cass next November.

### BIG DEMAND FOR STAMPS.

Revenue Collectors Estimate Three Months' Supply at 400,000,000.

WASHINGTON, July 2.—It was stated at the internal revenue bureau that fewer complaints of inability to get the new revenue stamps were received yesterday than were expected. The requirements of the collectors for an estimated three months' supply amounted to about 400,000,000 stamps. These requirements have been honored to the amount of over 200,000,000, and other shipments will be made as rapidly as possible. In a number of cities large crowds are reported as standing in line at the collector's office waiting to purchase stamps, but no serious inconvenience or trouble has been reported so far. There seems to be some danger that the supply in the hands of the collectors will be exhausted before renewals can be secured, but the bureau of engraving and printing and the internal revenue forces will work night and day as long as the situation seems to require, and before the middle of next week everyone, it is expected, will have an ample supply to meet all demands.

### CHICAGO PAPERS SUSPENDED.

Strike of Stereotypers Shuts Up All the Big Newspaper Offices.

CHICAGO, July 2.—None of the English newspapers were published in Chicago today, owing to a strike among the stereotypers. The stereotypers demanded a reduction in the hours of labor and an increase in wages. It was refused, and, as a result, at 8 o'clock last evening the stereotypers refused to go to work. The following newspapers have entirely suspended publication pending a settlement of the issue: Times-Herald, Record, Tribune, Chronicle, Inter-Ocean, Evening Post, Daily News, Evening Journal and the Dispatch.

### Anxiety at the War Department.

WASHINGTON, July 2.—The profoundest concern throughout military and official circles marked the opening of the second day upon which the battle of Santiago is being fought. The character of the fighting is now fully known at the war department. The information is in addition to the report made by General Shafter last midnight, when he roughly estimated his casualties at above 400. Later reports, officially direct from the field, indicate that this estimate was far too low. General Shafter had not, up to 11 o'clock this morning, placed any exact figure on his loss, but he made it clear that his first estimate at 400 was much short of the actual loss. The Associated Press dispatches from the field give the casualties at about 1,000 and it is in line with General Shafter's later intimation, although, as stated, he has set no figure.
