## WORK OF A BOLD THIEF

McElwain, the Jeweler, Loses Two Valuable Watches.

## FRUITLESS CHASE FOR VILLAIN

Walter J. Koon Stricken With Paralysis While Assisting in the Search For the Audacious Fugitive.

Last evening shortly after dark before many people were on the street, a man of ordinary appearance, wearing a brown suit of clothes, stepped into McElwain's jewelry store and wanted to buy a watch. He looked and made numerous enquiries of the proprietor and selecting two of the best ones, valued at wholesale at over \$50.00, he deliberately picked the time pieces up and saying he guessed he would take them both he shot for the door and out round the corner, and over onto vine street from where he ran to the river and was soon lost in the willows. McElwain shouted for the police and went in hot pursuit of the scoundrel but to no purpose.

W. J. Koon was in the store when the stranger came in, but had stepped out on the side walk when the theft occurred and joined in the rush to catch the thief. While near the depot Mr. Koon was stricken with paralysis and for a time his life was despaired of. He was carried to the Hotel Plattsmouth and Dr. Schildknecht was called. He rallied after a time and today he is much better, though not entirely out of danger.

The thief who caused all the commotion has not been seen or heard of today, though telegrams and postal cards have been sent in all directions to intercept him.

It is quite probable that he belongs to some of the Omaha gang of thugs and his capture or recovery of property is not probable.

**A Notable Gathering.**  
Uncle Noah Clemmons, residing seven miles south of town, is one of the pioneers of Cass county and his sterling qualities have found for him a warm place in the hearts of his neighbors. Mr. Clemmons has had some litigation recently over the title to his farm, which resulted at the last term of court, in a judgment in his favor, and so to attest their appreciation for him, and for his success, about seventy-five neighbors and other friends called on him last Saturday evening.

They brought cake and ice cream and other good things to eat, and with an abundance of good music, a most delightful evening was spent. Uncle Noah is past eighty-four years of age but is as bright and active as most men of fifty.

The boys were unable to secure any of the prizes though their appearance was certainly better than some of those who won. Larus camp from Union also made a fine appearance, nearly 100 members in uniform being in line.
